Without such activities, many within these communities would miss out entirely on these important life-saving programs.

Finally, I wish to sincerely thank the Royal Life Saving Society for your dedication and motivation to address and eliminate drowning deaths throughout New South Wales.

I am pleased to also announce that the NSW Government remains committed long term to water safety across NSW and therefore continues to financially support the objectives of the Society. I am confident that this support will bring about a continued positive trend in the form of a reduced number of fatal and non-fatal drownings into the future.

The NSW Government also announced in the 2017-18 Budget the Active Kids Rebate. \$207 million has been set aside for the Program over four years from early 2018. The Program will help reduce costs for parents by providing \$100 vouchers towards sporting and fitness related costs, including swimming lessons, for every school enrolled child per calendar year.

Lastly I would like to congratulate and acknowledge the vast contributions of Royal Life Saving members and examiners who continue to develop the water safety skills and knowledge of our communities. Their teachings and offerings continue to inspire and prepare our children for recreation and activities across all our stunning aquatic locations.

Message from the NSW Minister for Emergency Services

The Honourable Troy Grant MP

As the NSW Minister for Emergency Services I wish to acknowledge the significant dedication to water safety exhibited by the Royal Life Saving Society - Australia (New South Wales Branch).

Our water safety organisations play a vital role in providing advice and expertise to Government and communicating water safety messages to communities right across New South Wales, and indeed, the entire nation.

Australians spend much of their lives in and around water. Our traditional aquatic pastimes are by and large undertaken responsibly, but occasionally injuries and accidents do occur. The work of the Society is focused on developing the resilience and adaptability of our communities, so they can recognise and respond to changing water safety needs at a local level.

Since 1894, the NSW Branch of The Royal Life Saving Society has worked to reduce the incidence of drowning and turn everyday people into community lifesavers.

In recognition of its reputation for keeping the people of NSW safe by the water for over a century, the NSW Government allocated the Society \$585,000 as part of the 2016-17 NSW Water Safety Fund Community Grants Program to deliver the following projects:

- Improving pool safety for young children, including supervision in or around pools at all times, and promoting pool fence compliance;
- Educating men aged 25-34 years on the risks associated with consuming alcohol and drugs while engaging in aquatic activity through a social media campaign;
- Engaging risk-taking males aged 15-24 through a digital education resource and a free lifesaving certification system, targeting 225,000 teenagers in regional and remote schools over three years; and
- Teaching communities along the Hawkesbury, Murrumbidgee and Macquarie Rivers about water safety, common hazards, and swimming risks.

I am proud of the way community organisations, government agencies and educational precincts are working together to address water safety, after what was a tragic summer of drownings for our State.

The Office of Emergency Management (OEM) held its inaugural Annual Water Safety Forum at Parliament House on Tuesday 9 May 2017. The forum was attended by 80 representatives from 36 organisations operating in the water safety space, participants shared insights and ideas on how to reduce the number of drowning deaths in NSW. The OEM commissioned Royal Life Saving to analyse recent fatal drowning data.

As Minister, I was privileged to host this forum. The analysis of data shared with forum attendees, as well as the insights revealed through discussions, will be used to inform the Government's future drowning prevention measures. These measures will include refining the water safety public awareness campaign for the 2017/18 summer period to maximise its impact on high-risk communities, and providing the opportunity for water safety practitioners, academics, drowning prevention organisations and community groups to establish stronger links, and improve collaboration to reduce drowning.

In conclusion, I congratulate the Royal Life Saving Society and its network of community lifesavers who seek to educate, train and inform us about safe aquatic practices. I wish you well and look forward to continued developments to water safety and lifesaving skills over the next 12 months.

Message from the President of RLSSA New South Wales Branch

It is with great satisfaction that I report on 2016-17 - an extremely successful year for the Royal Life Saving Society — Australia (New South Wales Branch). The Society has ensured its key community obligations, that in which seeks to build a resilient and skilled aquatic community, have remained a priority focus.

In the last 12 months we have continued to engage communities and networks across NSW and have provided valuable education, training and support with more than a quarter of a million individuals receiving a swimming or lifesaving award. The skills these individuals have acquired not only provides them with an ability and confidence to enjoy a lifetime of aquatic participation but also the capacity to rescue or provide lifesaving aid to someone in need.

Of significant note is the increasing demands we are receiving from regional and remote communities across NSW. Our regional offices have provided an increased level of service and commitment over the last 12 months to supports our vision of a vast network of community lifesavers.

Every year an average of 102 people drown in NSW, with summer usually accounting for the highest number of fatalities. During the 2016-17 summer period, NSW witnessed a tragic series of drowning events across the state. The number of drowning deaths over this period and in particular between Christmas and New Year, was almost five times above the ten year average and resulted in extensive media coverage.

In response to these events, the NSW Government commissioned Royal Life Saving NSW to investigate the drowning deaths over the summer period in NSW. The investigation sought to bring clarification and insight to the period in question.

Between 1 December 2016 and 28 February 2017, 41 people drowned in NSW, including 17 between Christmas and New Year. Male fatalities accounted for 78.0% of the deaths. Indigenous people were also overrepresented in these drowning deaths, making up 4.9% of deaths but only accounting for 2.9% of the total NSW population. Although those born in Australia made up the majority of fatalities, countries of birth included individuals from China, Nepal, Pakistan and Vietnam, including five known deaths involving international students.

With an increasing state population, greater access to aquatic locations and warmer temperatures many resorted to our waterways for recreation and relaxation. Unfortunately this increased exposure and in some cases, lack of experience, led to this unprecedented outcome. Clear trends have emerged from this investigation, enabling the development and implementation of targeted prevention strategies based on high risk populations, locations and activities. By improving safety in and around our waterways, both fatal and non fatal incidents will be prevented, thus reducing the full burden of drowning. By utilising the available evidence and aligning efforts to the areas of most concern, Royal Life Saving NSW is confident positive progress can be achieved next summer and into the future.

The Society's commitment to the aquatic industry remains steadfast and the training of over 4,000 pool lifeguards each year seeks to ensure the public utilising community swimming pools experience highly trained lifeguards well versed in preventative actions and highly skilled rescue response. We are extremely proud of the standard and professionalism of this industry sector and Royal Life Saving will continue to contribute its intellectual knowledge and internationally renowned services as a means of strengthening our intent to reduce fatal and non-fatal drownings.

During the later phases of 2016-17 the Society agreed to terms with the NSW Education Department and entered into a formal deed to build a new aquatic facility on the grounds of Denistone East Public School. This new, modern facility will provide the local community and school population with a range of aquatic initiatives and activities to enhance their water safety skills. The Society's dedication to building community capacity has again been demonstrated via its organisational and financial commitment to such ventures and we greatly look forward to this new acquisition in approximately 18 months' time.

I would like to use this opportunity to recognise and thank the contributions of government, the community and our peers. The New South Wales Government through the Office of Sport, Sport and Recreation have continued to support Royal Life Saving NSW through the provision of core funding. In particular I would like to acknowledge the NSW Minister for Sport, The Honourable Stuart Ayres MP.

I would also like to thank the Office of Emergency Management and the NSW Minister for Emergency Services, The Honourable Troy Grant MP for key project support under the Government's Water Safety Fund Community Grants initiative.

A sincere thank you to our Patron, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Ret'd), Governor of New South Wales who once again generously agreed to host the Society's Commendation Ceremony at Government House. We were equally honoured that His Excellency the Honourable T.F. Bathurst AC, Lieutenant-Governor of New South Wales was available to present the Commendations to the worthy recipients.

Finally, thank you to our Board of Directors, volunteers, members, staff, supporters and stakeholders who continue to work collaboratively for the communities of New South Wales.

Message from the Chief Executive Officer

It is with a great deal of pride that I report on the activities of the Society for 2016-17. The last 12 months has witnessed a continued commitment to provide the communities of NSW with a comprehensive range of swimming and lifesaving programs and services.

Australians have a genuine passion for aquatic activities and experiences and seek to enjoy the wonderful aquatic environments that surround us. In most part, the majority have a wonderful experience and look forward to their next aquatic adventure. Unfortunately for some a trip to the river or lake, or a swim at the local pool can end in disaster. Many people within our community under-estimate conditions associated with an aquatic environment or over-estimate their swimming ability.

Whilst it is important that the Society continues to advocate and promote the risks of aquatic participation it is also vital that we reinforce the significant benefits that aquatic participation provides. The benefits to physical and mental health are well documented in addition to the social enjoyment we experience as families and friends gathering around water. With a commitment to learning swimming and survival from an early age we develop future generations with skills and knowledge that ensure safe participation.

During 2016-17, Royal Life Saving continued to receive strong support from the NSW Government for many of our drowning prevention objectives. This support came in the form of core funding via the Office of Sport and Water Safety Community funds through the Office of Emergency Management. These contributions have allowed the Society to target key drowning prevention priorities including:

- Strengthening child drowning prevention programs that raise awareness of the importance of adult supervision, pool fencing, water familiarisation and Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR).
- Development of a coordinated approach with consistent messages to highlight risks of alcohol/drugs and aquatic activity.
- Strengthening drowning prevention and healthy activity programs targeting people aged 65 and over including promoting workforce development and infrastructure planning.
- Development, implementation and evaluation of community-focused drowning prevention plans in known inland waterway drowning black spots.
- Develop and expand interventions aimed at reducing drowning risk among international students, Indigenous and CALD communities.
- Implementation of programs that improve aquatic facility management standards and practices and that minimise risk in aquatic recreational environments.
- Strengthening the skills, standards and recognition of paid and volunteer drowning prevention workforce.

These key priorities were identified through a systematic analysis of drowning and aquatic injury data over the last decade. The Society still seeks to bring about significant reductions in fatal and non-fatal drownings across NSW by 2020. This goal is shared by the current Australian Water Safety Strategy 2016-2020.

Our progress over the past 12 months has been positive and we are able to identify trends that indicate our work is bringing about changes in behaviour, understanding and attitude. Of significant note is the reduced drowning rate over the 2016-17 period in comparison to the previous 12 months. Whilst this trend is positive we can't be complacent and therefore a continuing commitment to key drowning prevention priorities is important.

To achieve our organisational objectives and goals the Society is reliant on many factors including the contributions from our many supporters. The Society was the beneficiary of community grants via the ClubGRANTS scheme which allowed for a range of local community education and training initiatives. These programs bring about water safety education opportunities for many who normally would go without. Our sincere thanks to these Registered Clubs and their members.

To our vast number of volunteers who provide lifesaving programs and services throughout our State, thank you. Your continued contribution to the Society and the community is vital to bring about a reduction in fatal and non-fatal drowning.

I would also like to use this opportunity to thank the NSW Government for its continued support. Our collaborative activities have ensured an elevated understanding of key water safety agendas and priorities. In particular special thanks to the NSW Minister for Sport, The Honourable Stuart Ayres MP and the NSW Minister for Emergency Services, The Honourable Troy Grant MP who continue to support the Society and show genuine interest in our activities

I would also like to acknowledge the contribution and support of our Patron, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Ret'd), Governor of New South Wales. Our Commendation Ceremony at Government House remains a highlight of each year and brings immense pride to well deserving recipients.

Finally, I wish to thank the Board of Directors and the staff for their continued efforts and commitment to the ethos of the Society. Our collective enthusiasm and dedication to task ensures future generations of aquatic users are in good hands.

Operations Overview

The 2016/17 year provided a number of challenges and opportunities for the Royal Life Saving NSW operational units. After experiencing a significant number of drownings over the summer it was critically important that our key advocacy, education and training commitments were comprehensively implemented and supported. Our staff, trainers and critical networks have worked tirelessly to ensure the communities of NSW have the resources and services they require to prepare for aquatic activity across a range of aquatic environments. Following is an overview of key programs and activities undertaken throughout the year.

Advocacy

Royal Life Saving's position on an extensive range of water safety issues in NSW has been developed through a commitment to research and "ground-level" activity. Our challenge is to ensure all the issues and our policy responses are understood and supported by government, industry, the corporate sector and the community.

Royal Life Saving is working hard to eliminate drowning. We believe that through coordinated and locally-driven education campaigns we can reduce the number of fatal and non-fatal drowning incidents that occur in NSW each year.

Our staff have actively participated in state and national water safety forums and engagements with other community stakeholders who are working to prevent drowning.

In the past year Royal Life Saving provided expert witness testimony and advice to coronial inquests. In addition, Royal Life staff provided input into a range of committees and advisory groups including the NSW Water Safety Advisory Council, AUSTSWIM NSW Advisory Council, Aquatic and Recreation Institute and NSW Sport and Recreation Industry Advisory committee.

It is important that Royal Life Saving works with and shares its intellectual content and expertise to bring about reductions in drowning.

Respect the River

With support from the NSW Government, Royal Life Saving NSW has provided a range of activities and support to promote safe aquatic recreation and prevent drowning in inland waterways. Rivers account for over one quarter of all drowning deaths, making rivers the leading location for drowning in Australia. It's simple – Respect the River.

Our key messaging includes:

- WEAR A LIFEJACKET
- AVOID ALCOHOL AROUND WATER
- NEVER SWIM ALONE
- LEARN HOW TO SAVE A LIFE.

Inland waterways contain many environments where drowning deaths occur – rivers, lakes, dams, irrigation channels, water tanks and creeks have all been sites of drowning deaths. The flat, still surface of an inland waterway can give a false sense of security. Currents, undertows or submerged objects – even in seemingly tranquil waterways – can prove to be very dangerous.

Inland waterways are not patrolled by lifeguards, and should someone get into trouble, there may be no one there to assist.

Our focus has been along the Murray and Murrumbidgee River communities and also where our education solutions have been in high demand. It is now important that we take our commitment to other river locations particularly those that are represented in the top 10 above.

Education and Training

Royal Life Saving's water safety education programs are designed so all Australians have the skills and knowledge to safely participate in a range of aquatic activities.

Our programs build awareness of dangers in aquatic environments, teach essential water safety skills and develop lifesaving skills that may one day save a life, reflecting Royal Life Saving's mantra that 'Everyone can be a Lifesaver'.

The range of programs allows individuals to continually develop their skills and knowledge as they move through different life stages, reflecting the unique challenges that are specific to each age group. These challenges include water familiarisation for young children, foundation skills for primary aged children, essential survival and lifesaving skills for teenagers and water safety for older adults.

Our key education programs include:

- Swim and Survive: Wonder (6–36 months) Active (3–5 years) Courage (5–14 years)
- Water Smart
- Bronze Medallion
- Bronze e-Lifesaving
- Grey Medallion.

Over the last 12 months we have issued more than 100,000 certificates for these programs. It has been important to ensure that regional and remote communities continue to have access to these initiatives to ensure ongoing aquatic resilience and water safety knowledge.

Our First Aid training courses continue to be compliant with Workplace Health and Safety requirements and provide participants with the knowledge and skills to administer first aid until professional medical help arrives.

Royal Life Saving NSW provides both traditional and flexible training delivery methods including First Aid in a Box – a self-paced, flexible training program. Candidates receive their own learning manikin and DVD and complete the theory and online assessments at their own pace.

Upon completing the online content and learning CPR, candidates are required to attend a practical workshop to refine their first aid skills and be assessed for their first aid qualification. Thousands of candidates have utilised this program over the last year and receiving increasing interest from many organisations.

Resuscitation - the actions taken to keep a person alive after their own breathing and heartbeat have stopped - can mean the difference between life and death. Early intervention with Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) can and will save lives. Royal Life Saving Resuscitation courses give participants training and knowledge in Basic Life Support, CPR, Defibrillation, Oxygen Resuscitation and Emergency Care.

All Royal Life Saving resuscitation training is delivered in accordance with the Australian Resuscitation Council (ARC) guidelines and gives both theoretical and practical experience in CPR and associated emergency care.

Over the last 25 years, Royal Life Saving NSW has issued more than 1 million certificates to successful resuscitation award candidates. This is a significant network of individuals whose possess the skills and knowledge to save a life.

Australian Pool Lifeguards are world-renowned for their high levels of skill and knowledge in accident prevention and rescue response. The minimum industry requirement for employment as a Pool Lifeguard in a swimming pool or aquatic facility is the Royal Life Saving NSW Pool Lifeguard Licence.

This entry-level qualification is recognised across Australia and in many other countries and provides a gateway into an exciting lifeguarding and aquatics career. The course covers essential modules such as accident prevention, administration, public relations, education, rescue response and basic technical operations.

Royal Life Saving believes that everyone can be a lifesaver. Whether as a responsible member of the community or for a lifesaving career, the skills you learn are skills for life. Last year more than 4,500 individuals achieved a Pool Lifeguard Licence therefore providing employment in the NSW aquatic industry.

AUSTSWIM is Australia's national organisation for the teaching of swimming and water safety and has gained an outstanding reputation. AUSTSWIM has developed a quality aquatic education program for those wishing to enter the aquatic industry as a teacher of swimming and water safety. The accreditation is the industry standard for Swimming and Water Safety Teachers™ and is delivered and recognised in each State and Territory of Australia and many countries overseas. As a foundation member of AUSTSWIM, Royal Life Saving NSW is a proud provider of AUSTSWIM courses including:

- Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety
- Teacher of Adults
- Teacher of Aquatics to People with Disabilities
- Teacher of Competitive Strokes
- Teacher of Infant and Preschool Aquatics.

Our particular focus is across regional and remote locations where approximately 900 qualifications were successfully completed. This provides a substantial network of highly skilled practitioners providing learn to swim programs to children, adults and those with a disability.

Royal Life Saving NSW also offers a Pool Operations course to assist industry bodies in meeting their obligations to industry best practice. This course is only one in a series of programs that Royal Life Saving offers to industry. This course provides candidates with the knowledge and skills relevant to the supervision and operation of an aquatic facility, plant and associated equipment and the monitoring and maintaining of water quality. This course is the industry standard for pool supervisors. Our new online program ensures candidates can complete the necessary assessment activities at their own speed. Linked with practical workshops the program ensure relevant content and mentoring support.

Working in the Aquatic and Recreation Industry can lead to a dynamic, balanced and flexible career with a range of employment opportunities. Royal Life Saving NSW has assisted candidates to improve and succeed in their chosen career by providing a range of Professional Development courses and workshops including Emergency Procedures, Supervisors and Aquatic Customer Service right through to a full qualification in Certificate III in Aquatics.

Health Promotion

Royal Life Saving's commitment to reducing drowning and aquatic-related incidents is best seen through the creation of water safe communities.

Royal Life Saving has achieved this through a proud history of promoting safe aquatic recreation and by developing health promotion programs that target special needs groups such as:

- Children under five (Keep Watch)
- Remote Indigenous Communities
- Rural and Regional Communities
- Refugees, Recent Arrivals and Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Communities
- Older Australians (Grey Medallion)
- Others including alcohol related drowning deaths.

Keep Watch continues to be Australia's most comprehensive drowning prevention and water safety program for children under five. The program has a wide range of resources and sub-programs targeting parents and carers that are designed for specific locations such as bath time, the farm and public pools.

With over 100 public pools across NSW participating in the Keep Watch @ Public Pools program, and thousands of resources distributed across NSW, Royal Life Saving continues to work towards ensuring that all children under the age of five are safe when in, on, or around water.

CASE STUDY

In response to the high number of fatalities over summer, Royal Life Saving NSW ramped up efforts to provide vital water safety education and lifesaving training to at-risk communities across the state.

A snapshot of some of our 2016-17 achievements are listed below:

METROPOLITAN SYDNEY

- 7884 Kindergarten students across Sydney learnt how to stay safe in a range of aquatic environments through our Water Smart Kindy Kids Initiative.
- 900 Stage 3 students in Western Sydney learnt about the dangers associated with rivers, creeks, lakes and dams as part of our Inland Water Smart Program.
- Over 800 Year 11 students in Sydney undertook nationally recognised First Aid and CPR training as part of our First Aid Safe Youth Initiative.
- 180 Culturally diverse adults in Western Sydney learnt to Swim as well as learning vital CPR skills as part of our CALD Adults Learn to Swim and Survive Initiative.
- 50 children aged 3-5 from CALD backgrounds in Western Sydney learnt how to swim as part of our Pre-schoolers Learn to Swim and Survive Initiative.

REGIONAL NSW

•75 year 10 students from regional NSW (Hunter, Northern, Western, Illawarra, Orange and Riverina) completed a Youth Led CPR Initiative which saw students not only trained in First Aid and CPR also trained local year 5/6 students in CPR via a leadership program.

Aquatic Safety Training Academy (ASTA)

The Aquatic Safety Training Academy continued to play a vital role in the education of Western Sydney communities in the lifesaving skills of swimming and water safety in the past year. Delivering more than 400 water safety lessons to more than an average of 2,000 participants in weekly water safety programs is just one measure of ASTA's success in building water safe communities.

ASTA continues to provide high quality programs to local schools and community groups with more than 22 schools attending ASTA in 2016/17 to complete Swim and Survive, the Aquatic Survival Challenge, Bronze Star and Bronze Medallion programs.

Increasingly over the last 12 months adult participation in water safety programs has become a focus for the team at ASTA. Royal Life Saving has been successful in accessing vital funding for adult learn to swim programs delivered at the Aquatic Safety Training Academy. Local groups including Westmead Community Hub, Hilltop Road Community Group and NSW Community Hubs took up the opportunity to get involved to an overwhelmingly positive response.

"This is the first time I have done swimming lessons. Where I used to live in India there were not many opportunities to swim... My daughter and husband know how to swim and every Sunday I used to drive them to swimming and back, so looking at them, I got interested in swimming. This program helped me to join. Now I'm able to enter the pool and I don't feel like the water will drown me. I used to panic in the first class, now after seeing my friends swimming, I'm happy."—Anita

Funded programs such as these, demonstrate an overwhelming need to bring greater opportunities for water safety education to adults in the communities of Western Sydney and engaging culturally and linguistically diverse communities in Australia's strong aquatic tradition. More than two-thirds of participants have continued to access swimming lessons and continue their aquatic education journey.

Spreading the water safety message is at the forefront of daily operations. From monthly workshops to water safety focuses and CPR sessions, the Aquatic Safety Training Academy aims to equip visitors with the knowledge of a range of aquatic environments. Our deep-water workshops have proved incredibly popular where residents from the local community could come and experience deep water, participate in different education activities and gain a greater understanding of their abilities and the risks associated with different aquatic environments.

Maitland Pool Opening

Illawarra Regional Office

The Illawarra Regional Office has experienced another busy and productive year, with figures showing a large increase in Pool Lifeguard Training throughout the Region and a slight increase in First Aid numbers. The largest growth (number of participants undertaking a training course with the Society) has been experienced with the CPR and Anaphylaxis training, conducted within the local school sector, mostly for the teaching staff.

We were all shocked at the summer drowning data, at the time it seemed never ending. The Illawarra was part of the tragic circumstances, as per our traditional contribution to the drowning toll, it was again with the loss of life in older men participating in aquatic activities for recreation.

The Illawarra is very proud of the minimal number of drownings in the younger 0-14 age bracket, for the past 23 years the Illawarra has not followed the National trend in the 0-5 age groups. Whilst we witness the positive trend in this young age group the same can't be said re males 45 years and over. The Illawarra Office will seek to increase its activities supporting older Australians as a means of reducing fatal and non-fatal drownings.

A strategic partnership with Coordinaire has enabled the Illawarra office to undertake Grey Medallion programs in local aquatic facilities at Pambula, Vincentia, Nowra, Kiama, Shellharbour and Wollongong. The Grey Medallion program has been very well received by the community and the aquatic facilities have enjoyed facilitating the program, however there is a long road ahead to in educating our males 65+, ingraining safety habits in and around the water.

I was proud to present to Melissa Corby the Sir Walter Leonard Memorial Trophy. Some 17 years ago I met with Melissa and the then Principle of Mary Brooksbank School, in Rosemeadow. Melissa indicated that each and every child of the school be put through a weekly swim lesson, using the Swim and Survive as the delivery model. Fortunately, everyone agreed and Melissa has for 17 years delivered to each student a weekly learn to swim lesson. It is this dedication and inspiration in working with children with a disability that saw Melissa awarded the Sir Walter Leonard Memorial Trophy. Congratulations Melissa you are a very worthy recipient of the Trophy, I truly hope you are able to continue your program for another 17 years.

I would like to thank the 11 Local Government Councils Shires, State Government Departments, Schools and Tertiary Institutions, Public and Private Swimming Pools, and all individuals that have assisted the Illawarra Regional Office prevent the loss of life by supporting and working with the Society. The office staff of Tracey McMaster, Nicole Wiles and Carly Ryan, I thank you for your dedication to the Society and making our work time in the Illawarra Regional Office, an enjoyable environment.

Western Regional Office

Royal Life Saving enjoyed a really busy year across the Western Region during 2016/17 and our office was kept on its toes with courses and programs across a number of areas. Participation in our vocational courses continues to expand and this is supported by the dedicated trainers and volunteers working throughout our community and school networks and advocating for lifesaving awareness and training at every opportunity.

Training for staff of the Department of Education

Training in Resuscitation and Anaphylaxis for Department of Education staff has again kept our office very busy over the last twelve months, with approximately 2750 school teachers right across our region undertaking training under the new provider model. Our valued examiners continue to train where they can and many have found other avenues to advocate for first aid and lifesaving awareness within their communities.

First Aid Trainer Accreditation

Towards the end of the financial year we welcomed our first aid trainers to Orange for professional development opportunities. Two workshops were held, with just on fifty trainers who deliver our CPR and First Aid training courses with school, organisation or community settings taking the opportunity to attend. The region's Pool Lifeguard trainers will also have the same opportunity when their annual update occurs later in the year. I must say a big 'Thank You' to one of our fantastic trainers and long-time Royal Life Saving advocates, Kirsty England, who developed the content and conducted the trainer workshops on our behalf.

Bridgette, Thomas and Raymond Jones - Commendation Awards

Each year Royal Life Saving NSW presents Commendation Awards to people who have displayed outstanding initiative, expertise and empathy towards their fellow human beings by applying life saving skills in emergency situations. Following is one such example of a rescue that occurred at a regional swimming centre last summer. Congratulations to Bridgette, Thomas and Raymond on recognition of their efforts.

"On the morning of Tuesday, 17th January, 2017, Bridgette Jones was manager on duty at the Cobar Memorial Swimming Pool. The staff member rostered on to work with Bridgette did not come to work so Bridgette organised for her eldest son Thomas (16 years) to come in and be on duty as the pool lifeguard. Her youngest son Raymond (12 years) was rostered to work in the kiosk. At approximately 11.30am, Thomas went to the pool plant room and Bridgette took over as pool lifequard. While she was surveying the pool an elderly man who was swimming with his wife, suddenly went under the water suffering a suspected heart attack. His wife screamed for help. Bridgette called for Thomas and then with the aid of a bystander, removed the man from the pool. Bridgette checked his airway, breathing and found no signs of life. Thomas arrived and immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Bridgette ran to the kiosk and asked Raymond to phone emergency services and make an announcement to clear the pool. She collected the oxygen equipment from the manager's office and rushed it back to the patient. Ambulance officers arrived in approximately 10 minutes and they asked Thomas to continue CPR as they set up their equipment injected the patient with adrenaline. Once stabilised he was transported to hospital. High Commendations are awarded to Bridgette, Thomas and Raymond Jones. Bridgette and Thomas had only completed their lifeguard course last season and Thomas was only 16 years old. The way they handled the major emergency showed their professionalism, determination and precise actions in attempting to save the life of this man. The community and the family of the patient have given nothing but praise and positive comments with the way they handled the incident."

Vale Ernita McGrath

It was with great sadness that we learnt of the passing of a local legend, Ernita McGrath earlier this year. Ernita began her lifesaving career with Royal Life Saving in 1952 as a Swim and Survive Examiner, progressing to a Bronze Examiner and then finally to the highest level within our Examiner system, an Advanced Examiner. You will note in the Honours listing after my report that Ernita was conferred the honour of RLSSA Australian Life Membership in recognition of her dedication to lifesaving and water safety over so many years. Ernita was a wonderful lady who gave so much to her community, not just through lifesaving but in so many other ways, and she will be missed by everyone.

In conclusion, the work undertaken in our region is driven to a large extent by our motivated and dedicated trainers, examiners and volunteers and we thank you for all your efforts over the last twelve months. Thank you also to our Head Office staff and Board of Directors for your support and guidance throughout the year, and also to Jenny who excels at keeping the paperwork in our small office on a tight leash. We will continue to strive to provide a valuable service to the communities of the Western Region in the coming year.

The following people were recognised for their extraordinary efforts in rendering assistance and attempting to save a life. The RLS Commendation Awards fall under the categories of Certificate of Commendation, NSW Police Service Award, Fire & Rescue NSW Award, NSW Ambulance Service Award and NSW Rural Fire Service Award.

The Royal Life Saving Society Australia New South Wales Branch would like to congratulate each of these wonderful Commendation Award recipients. I hope you read their citations with interest.

Certificate of Commendation presented to:

Gavin Martin

On the afternoon of 23 February, 2015, Gavin Martin was at his home in Bega when he heard his neighbour scream uncontrollably. Gavin went to his rear balcony to see his neighbour running from the pool area of their property with her youngest female child in her arms. Gavin immediately deduced that the baby had been in the pool and he contacted emergency services.

Gavin then ran from his house and into the rear yard of his neighbours and saw the little girl lying on the grass. He then placed his mobile phone on loud speaker in order to hear instructions from emergency services. Gavin noticed that the little girl's lips were blue and that her eyes were rolled back in her head. He rolled her on to her side to make sure her airway was clear, then rolled her on to her back, tilted her head back and gave two short breaths into her lungs. Under instruction from the 000 operator, he commenced and continued Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the little girl until the arrival of the ambulance. He continued CPR until the ambulance officers were in a position to take over from him and continued to assist until she was conveyed to the Bega District Hospital. Gavin remained and comforted the family and also sought other friends to come and assist him.

High Commendations are awarded to Gavin Martin for responding and without hesitation giving assistance in what must have been a very traumatic situation in an attempt to save the life of this little girl.

Lily Fernandez and Joel Toniato

About 6.30pm on 8 September, 2015, Lily Fernandez and Joel Toniato were carrying out their duties as lifequards at Blacktown Leisure Centre.

A four year old boy was swimming in the wave pool unaccompanied. During his swim, he drifted to the deep end of the pool and started to panic. Lily was stationed on the wave pool and was the first responder, noticing that the little boy was under the water. She alerted all staff at the centre via two way radio prior to entering the water to rescue him. Joel Toniato proceeded to the wave pool via the emergency access and assisted Lily in removing him from the water. Once on the beach area of the wave pool, Joel and Lily cleared his airway, checked for a pulse and not finding one, commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Joel also co-ordinated staff to phone the ambulance and kept the crowd under control. Together they continued CPR until the arrival of the ambulance and the little boy regained consciousness. He was taken to hospital for a check-up and observation and remained there for two days. He subsequently made a full recovery and has since returned to swimming lessons.

High Commendations are awarded to Lily Fernandez and Joel Toniato for taking prompt and proper action. Their swift actions were undoubtedly instrumental in saving the life of this little boy.

Certificate of Commendation presented to: Rowan Pollard

About 10.30pm on 13 October, 2014, a single cab Toyota Hilux Utility was travelling north on a country road in Bendemeer. Three teenagers had been partying with friends and were on their way home when the male driver became distracted causing him to lose control of the vehicle which skidded in the gravel and rolled several times. Both passengers were ejected from the vehicle suffering severe

injuries. The young male driver, although suffering deep lacerations on his head and hand, made his way to Rowan Pollard's farmhouse 3 kilometres down the road to raise the alarm and obtain help.

While Rowan's wife attended to the young driver's bleeding lacerations to his head and left shoulder and phoned emergency services, Rowan drove directly to the site of the accident. When he arrived he could see a young male standing by the side of the road pointing to where the female passenger was lying. Rowan grabbed a torch and some towels and went to her aid. The young female passenger was unconscious and suffering suspected life threatening injuries. Rowan checked her for signs of open wounds or bleeding and checked her breathing which was very rattly. He tried to ask her where she hurt but was unresponsive and moaning. He placed a towel over her to keep her warm and prevent her from going in to shock and kneeling down, supported her head and neck to prevent her moving as he suspected head and/or neck injuries. He remained in this position for in excess of two hours until numerous other persons including family and ambulance officers arrived and were able to stabilise and brace her neck and release him from his position. The three occupants of the vehicle were transported to hospital. The female passenger remained unconscious at the scene and was placed in an induced coma at Tamworth Hospital before being flown to John Hunter Hospital. She suffered bleeding and swelling to the brain along with spine and pelvic fractures and internal injuries including lacerations to her liver and kidneys. She subsequently made a full recovery and suffered no permanent damage. The young male passenger required surgery and skin grafts to his left shoulder while the young driver had non-life threatening injuries.

High Commendations are awarded to Rowan Pollard. The location was remote and in darkness in the middle of the night and was approximately one hour from any emergency services. He has remained calm, and without his professional and compassionate actions it is possible the injuries to the young female could have been significantly worse.

About 7.05pm on Wednesday, 30 March, 2016 Joel Trist was surfing with his friend Brett Connellan at Bombo Beach, Kiama. They were about 100-150 metres off shore when Joel noticed a sudden commotion about 50 metres away. The first thing he saw was Brett thrashing around in the water, screaming. Brett had been knocked off his board and attacked by a shark. The attack caused massive injuries to Brett's left upper thigh and left hand. He however managed to fend off the shark, before Joel paddled over to him to render assistance. He managed to prop him up on to his surfboard as Brett was going in and out of consciousness due to shock and massive blood loss. He screamed to Agnieska Krowka who was on the shore to phone emergency services.

With both people on the one board it was a struggle to get to shore with Joel paddling and kicking unaware of the whereabouts of the shark. Joel dragged the victim on to the shore where he was assisted by Agnieska Krowka and John

Neville, both registered nurses. Agnieska and John applied a tourniquet using the leg rope from the board which was critical in stemming the blood from the massive injuries sustained. Together they kept the victim calm, reassured and monitored his state of consciousness until emergency services were able to take over. Both ambulance and police officers arrived on scene a short time later. Ambulance officers worked quickly to stabilise the victim and treat his injuries. Police were able to assist ambulance officers with treatment and co-ordinate the landing and departure of the air ambulance. He was stabilised and flown to Kogarah Hospital for life saving surgery.

High Commendations are awarded to Joel Trist, Agnieska Krowka and John Neville. Joel's fast thinking and selfless actions in swimming over to his friend, together with the swift actions of Agnieska and John rendering critical first aid, were paramount in saving the life of his friend Brett.



Stephen Limebeer

Certificate of Commendation presented to: Stephen Limebeer

About 12.30pm on 2 May, 2016, an elderly woman collapsed and fell heavily on to a congested roadway at Parkside Plaza, Miranda. The victim sustained life threatening injuries including severe lacerations and fractures to her arms, legs, hips, pelvis and skull. She lay motionless directly in the path of oncoming traffic with the real possibility of being struck by vehicles. She was fading in and out of consciousness and in extreme distress from pain and had difficulty breathing.

Stephen Limebeer was in the vicinity and immediately phoned 000. He ran to the patient and treated her for severe bleeding whilst supporting her head and neck for potential spinal injuries. He made splints out of towels and other available materials to support potential fractures. He also maintained control of the entire scene ensuring that bystanders kept away and that the victim's property was protected at all times. He placed his body between the victim and moving vehicles. Ambulance officers arrived approximately 20 minutes later and after stabilising the victim, transported her to hospital where she remained for a number of months.

High Commendations are awarded to Stephen Limebeer. This was an extremely stressful situation and he took control and his actions demonstrated initiative, expertise and empathy towards a fellow human being by applying lifesaving first aid. If not for his actions, the victim may have passed away at the scene.

At approximately 3.45pm on Saturday, 20 February, 2016, a father and his son decided to go for a swim at Bluey's Beach near Foster. Once they entered the water they quickly became caught in a rip and though the son was a competent swimmer, the father was not and soon began to panic and thrash around in the water. The son tried to assist his father however quickly found himself struggling to help his father on his own and called for help.

Matthew Grimmond, Sophia Vancamp and Stephanie Dixon were close by on the beach and heard the calls for help. They saw the man's head go under the water a number of times. Grabbing a body board, they swam out to the man and managed to place him on the board and swim him back to shore. The son was able to swim to safety unassisted. The man was conscious, breathing and he began to vomit due to ingesting a considerable amount of sea water. He was treated at the scene by the ambulance personnel.

High Commendations are awarded to Matthew Grimmond, Sophia Vancamp and Stephanie Dixon. Their swift actions were undoubtedly instrumental in saving this man's life.



Hassan El-Sayed

The Federal election was held on Saturday, 2 July, 2016. Hassan El-Sayed was one of approximately 100 people waiting in line to vote at Blaxcell Street Public School at Guildford when an elderly person nearby suddenly collapsed to the floor. A young woman screamed "somebody please help my father!"

Hassan immediately rushed over to the victim and his family and identified himself as a first-aider. Hassan knelt down and removed the victim's dentures, cleared his airway and checked his vital signs. The patient was not breathing and he could not locate a pulse. He asked a member of the public to phone emergency services and commenced cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). A large crowd was gathering and he asked them to stand back and give the victim some dignity. Paramedics arrived approximately 15 minutes later and asked Hassan to continue CPR while they set up their equipment. Once paramedics took over resuscitation of the patient they asked Hassan to continue to aid them with the emergency. Once stabilised the patient was transported to Westmead Hospital where doctors and nursing staff continued medical treatment.

High Commendations are awarded to Hasan El-Sayed. This was an extremely stressful situation and he was the only person in the large crowd to offer assistance. He took control and did his utmost to preserve the life of this elderly man.

Bridgette, Thomas and Raymond Jones

On the morning of Tuesday, 17th January, 2017, Bridgette Jones was manager on duty at the Cobar Memorial Swimming Pool. The staff member rostered on to work with Bridgette did not come to work so Bridgette organised for her eldest son Thomas (16 years) to come in and be on duty as the pool lifeguard. Her youngest son Raymond (12 yeas) was rostered to work in the kiosk.

At approximately 11.30am, Thomas went to the pool plant room and Bridgette took over as pool lifeguard. While she was surveying the pool an elderly man who was swimming with his wife, suddenly went under the water suffering a suspected heart attack. His wife screamed for help. Bridgette called for Thomas and then with the aid of a bystander, removed the man from the pool. Bridgette checked his airway, breathing and found no signs of life. Thomas arrived and immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Bridgette ran to the kiosk and asked Raymond to phone emergency services and make an announcement to clear the pool. She collected the oxygen equipment from the manager's office and rushed it back to the patient. Ambulance officers arrived in approximately 10 minutes and they asked Thomas to continue CPR as they set up their equipment injected the patient with adrenaline. Once stabilised he was transported to hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Bridgette, Thomas and Raymond Jones. Bridgette and Thomas had only completed their lifeguard course last season and Thomas was only 16 years old. The way they handled the major emergency showed their professionalism, determination and precise actions in attempting to save the life of this man. The community and the family of the patient have given nothing but praise and positive comments with the way they handled the incident.



Jack Lance Hollingworth

On the morning of Monday, 7th March, 2016, Jack Hollingworth was heading back to shore after a morning surf when he noticed something rolling around in the waves at South Newcastle beach. On closer inspection he saw the body of a man. Jack immediately went to his aid, turned him over and saw that his eyes had rolled back. He checked the man's vital signs and soon realised he was not breathing with no pulse.

Jack began swimming the man back to shore – a distance of approximately 20 metres. Exhausted, he shouted for help as he tried to drag the man up the sand. The beach was almost empty but another man ran over and helped drag the unconscious man up the beach. Together they turned him over and commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) as there was still no breathing or pulse. Three other people came to help, one bringing a defibrillator, and together this group of strangers worked like clockwork, alternating CPR. After approximately 10 minutes of CPR and a couple of shocks from a defibrillator, the man started coming back and his eyes opened and they rolled him into the recovery position. Ambulance officers arrived and transported the patient to hospital where he was reported to be in a stable condition.

High commendations are awarded to Jack Lance Hollingworth whose actions were outstanding. If Jack had not seen the man and dragged him to shore the result would have been a retrieval not a rescue and resuscitation.

New South Wales Police Award presented to: Senior Constable Christopher Vallis

At approximately 9.30pm on Friday, 13th March, 2015, Paulo Sagala had just finished a game of Golden Oldies Rugby at Killara and was being driven home by a friend. While driving down The Commenarra Parkaway, the car suddenly veered towards the left side of the road, colliding with the guard rail and beginning to roll down the hill. Paulo applied the hand brake and managed to bring the vehicle to a complete stop. Paulo looked at his friend and he had a fixed stare – unbeknown to Paulo suffering a cardiac arrest.

When the car stopped, Paulo got out of the car and tried to arouse his friend but there was no response. He pulled him out of the car laying him on the roadway and tried to wave down passing cars. Melilnda Chambers stopped and ran over and checked James for vital signs. She determined that he was unconscious and did not have a pulse so decided to begin Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) which she had only learned the previous month. Noel Gurney also ran to help and began Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) on the patient. Melinda was tiring from CPR, so asked Paulo to help, giving him brief instructions as he had never learnt CPR but carried it out with the help of instruction from Melinda. Dr Maros Elsik, a cardiologist, also stopped. He checked on the patient and assisted those already performing CPR, refining their techniques. Senior Constable Christopher Vallis and his partner arrived a short time later, he took control of the situation, taking over CPR from Paulo. NSW Ambulance arrived approximately five minutes later and a defibrillator was used successfully restoring the cardiac rhythm and cardiac output to the patient. Ambulance requested an escort to Royal North Shore Hospital which was provided by the Highway Patrol. The patient remained unconscious for a further seven days where he underwent a triple bypass.

High Commendations are awarded to Paulo Sagala, Melinda Chambers, Noel Gurney, Dr Maros Elsik and Senior Constable Christopher Vallis. The victim was fortunate that there were a number of people who assisted in his cardiac episode by conducting CPR until the arrival of ambulance officers. The fact this man is alive and well is a testament to the fantastic efforts of all of the people who participated in this traumatic emergency.

Senior Constable Judith Crawford

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Judith Crawford

At approximately 7.16pm on 17 May, 2014 Senior Constable Judith Cawford answered a call for urgent help for a person who had gone into cardiac arrest. Working solo, within a minute she had located the house and ran straight inside to find a woman who was performing Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on her husband. She was holding a phone to her ear, taking instructions from the 000

operator. Senior Constable Crawford checked the patient and could see that he was unconscious, not breathing and had no pulse and was cold to touch. The 000 operator instructed her to take over CPR and perform 600 compressions. The operator was calm, cool and collected and counted all the compressions giving great assistance to Senior Constable Crawford. At about 550 compressions the operator instructed her to complete two breaths after which she recommenced CPR compressions, completing another 100 more with the operator advising not to stop. She continued CPR until the patient moaned and moved his arm and then open his eyes at which point she placed him in the recovery position. About 10 minutes later volunteer ambulance officers arrived along with the local doctor who treated the patient and he was taken to Parkes Hospital and later flown to Sydney. He was gravely ill and not expected to survive. Senior Crawford kept in contact with the family and after a few weeks in hospital had improved and astounded doctors with his rapid recovery. He had an aorta tear to his heart and should not have survived, especially in such a remote country area.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Judith Crawford. She performed CPR for an extended period of time by herself and was successful in reviving the patient who most likely would not have survived this incident without her assistance.



Sergeant Rowan Webber

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Sergeant Rowan Webber, Sergeant Ian Marshall and Senior Constable Chris Cox

In the early afternoon of 29 April, 2015, police were called to a home in Castle Hill where a 15 year old female had been found hanging from a basketball hoop. The victim's sister had found her and on hearing her screams, neighbours had jumped over the fence to assist. They managed to lift her out of the noose, laid her down and checked for vital signs. They observed that she was still warm to

touch but her body was limp and her neck was badly bruised. One of the neighbours commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the other phoned emergency services.

First on the scene was Sergeant Ian Marshall who immediately took over CPR whilst the attending abulance officers were performing treatment on the female in an effort to revive her. Shortly after Sergeant Rowan Webber has taken over CPR duties to give Sergeant Marshall a rest. He continued CPR for up to 10 minutes without a break. During this time ambulance officers were attempting to ascertain through hysterical family members present the last time the young female was seen alive. Senior Constable Chris Cox took over CPR until further paramedics arrived and the girl was put on a stretcher and loaded into the ambulance at which stage a paramedic took over CPR. Further ambulance officers arrived and the decision was made to transport the young female to Westmead Childrens Hospital under police escort. Sergeant Webber provided the urgent medical escort to Westmead Hospital necessary for such an emergency.

High Commendations are awarded to Sergeant Rown Webber, Sergeant Ian Marshall and Senior Constable Chris Cox. Situations such as this are extremely stressful and chaotic for first responders, especially when family members are present. The officers showed professionalism and skill in their outstanding efforts performing CPR and getting the female to hospital for continued treatment and efforts to revive her.



Constable Hayley Bennett

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Sergeant Phillip John Mounce-Stephens, Senior Constable Mitchell John Christie, Constable Hayley Bennett and Constable Thomas Alexander Martin

On 9th November, 2014, a man attended Orange police station to report that he was concerned for the welfare of his brother who had been sending disturbing text messages to family members indicating intentions of self-harm. Sergeant Phillip

John Mounce-Stephens who was performing supervisor duties arranged for the missing person's mobile phone to be tracked which indicated that it was at the home address.

Senior Constable Mitchell John Christie and Constable Thomas Alexander Martin were tasked to attend the address and make enquiries. They spoke with the room mate of the missing person who informed police that he had not seen him or his vehicle. There was a semi attached garage at the back of the premises which was locked and usually full of furniture items and in his opinion, would not be able to hold a motor vehicle. Senior Constable Christie and Constable Martin searched the premises and stormwater drains at the rear of the property and were about to leave when they heard the room mate yell out for assistance. He had unlocked the garage and found the motor vehicle inside. The engine was not running, however there was a strong smell of exhaust fumes in the garage. Constable Martin went to the front driver's side of the vehicle and found the missing person in the front seat who was completely unresponsive. He pulled him from the vehicle and Senior Constable Christie immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Constable Martin requested assistance from ambulance and other police and continued performing CPR with Senior Constable Christie. A short time late Constable Hayley Bennett and Sergeant Mounce-Stephens attended the scene. Sergeant Mounce-Stephens assumed command of the situation and as Martin and Christie were showing signs of exhaustion from the demands of performing CPR, he and Constable Bennett took over CPR. Constables Martin and Bennett and Senior Constable Christie continued to perform CPR until the arrival of NSW ambulance officers who stabilised the victim and transported him to Orange Health Service a short time later.

High Commendations are awarded to Sergeant Phillip John Mounce-Stephens, Senior Constable Mitchell John Christie, Constable Hayley Bennett and Constable Thomas Alexander Martin. The officers showed great professionalism and worked together as a team in an attempt to preserve this person's life.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Sergeant Matthew Lehmann

Scott Enfield

About 7.30am on Saturday, 12 July, 2014 Scott Enfield and his friend of 24 years arrived at the Garigal National Park, Terrey Hills where they had planned to do a 30klm cross country run through the fire trail as part of their training regime. When

they were about 5 klm into their run Scott's friend said to him that he needed to sit down and Scott observed him to appear pale and he fell to the ground. Scott removed his backpack, placed him in the recovery position and checked his vital signs. His friend appeared to have stopped breathing so Scott commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and contacted emergency personnel. Due to the nature of the terrain and the fact that he was not sure of their exact location, Scott performed CPR for approximately 45 minutes until the arrival of police and NSW Air Ambulance.

Sergeant Lehmann responded quickly. On arrival there was no indication as to where Scott and his friend were located. For this reason Sergant Lehmann ran into the bushland and found that the area was mostly unntouched rugged and steep bush, with loose rocks and no real obvious track. He ran down the hill in a zigzag path in order to cover the most ground and to deal with the steep gradient of the hill. After some time, he found a rough track and commenced running along this in an easterly direction. Some time later he located Scott and his friend and saw that Scott was performing CPR. Sergeant Lehmann took over CPR while the NSW Ambulance Helicopter crew landed and they set up their equipment and proceeded to use a defibrillator on the victim.

High Commendations are awarded to Scott Enfield and Sergeant Matthew Lehmann whose actions were, in all of the circumstances, exemplary. The dedication of both of them rendering aid to the patient was an example of unwavering compassion and determination under difficult circumstances.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Leading Senior Constable Denise Craig

At about 8.30pm on Monday, 12 November, 2012, police were called to a home after reports of a 21 year old man with stab wounds to his neck. A number of police vehicles responded to the call, with Constable Denise Craig and her partner being first on the scene. They were met at the front door by the girlfriend of the victim who was screaming that he was dying. She had contacted emergency services and revealed that the victim had taken a knife and stabbed himself several times in the neck after an argument.

Constable Craig and her partner ran upstairs and saw large amounts of blood on the floor and walls. In a bedroom they saw the victim being cradled by his father who was applying pressure to an extensive open wound to his neck which was bleeding profusely. Constable Craig took over from the victim's father until ambulance services arrived. An ambulance attended and conveyed the victim to Liverpool Hospital. The ambulance crew praised the actions of police stating that had police not taken the action they did it was likely the victim would have died at the scene. The victim arrived at the hospital alive but in a critical condition. He was stabilised overnight but placed on life support.

High Commendations are awarded to Constable Denise Craig. She responded quickly and without hesitation to this traumatic incident and selflessly attempted to save the life of this man despite being covered in blood and bodily fluids.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Anthony Lynes and Senior Constable Andrew Liashenko

On the morning of Friday 2nd August, 2013 Senior Constable Anthony Lynes and Senior Constable Andrew Liashenko responded to a concern for welfare broadcast stating an "unconscious male in vehicle" outside a property in Lurnea. On arrival they observed two male persons removing an unconscious man from a motor vehicle and placing him on the grass area near the pavement. One of the males had just commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) when Senior Constable Lynes took over from him and continued for over ten minutes. The patient was unconscious, not breathing and had no pulse. Senior Constable Liashenko notified police radio of the situation continuing to check the patient's pulse and maintained comunications with the 000 operator while continuing assessment of the patient's condition.

Ambulance personnel arrived and took over CPR. A short time later the patient was monitored, received life-saving defibrillation shocks and CPR was continued on route to Liverpool District Hospital. He was stabilised in the emergency department before going to the cardiac lab to receive cardiac stents.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Anthony Lynes and Senior Constable Andrew Liashenko for their swift action in administering vital first aid which was responsible for saving the life of this man. Ambulance officers commended them for their efforts, stating that without the CPR the patient would have definitely died.



Inspector Darren Brown

New South Wales Police Award presented to: Inspector Darren Brown

About 7.30 pm on Saturday, 2 February, 2013, Inspector Darren Brown from Miranda LAC was flagged down by members of the public as an elderly female had collapsed in the Sea-Level Restaurant at Cronulla. She was sharing a meal with her family and suddenly grabbed her head and fell to the floor.

Inspector Brown responded immediately and located the patient who was not breathing, did not have a pulse and was unresponsive laying on the floor. After requesting urgent assistance from NSW ambulance, he cleared the area and commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on her. He acted as a single unit and was not assisted by any person in the restaurant. A short time later further police arrived and assisted Inspector Brown. During the CPR performed by police the patient regained a pulse and was able to squeeze his hand. After about 20 minutes she was conveyed to Sutherland Hospital with a faint heart beat.

High Commendations are awarded to Inspector Darren Brown who responded and without hesitation gave assistance in what must have been a very traumatic situation in an attempt to save this woman's life.

About 12 noon on Tuesday, 2nd June, 2009, a young man with a history of mental illness walked into Armidale police station confessing to stealing his father's car. Police took him to Armidal Hospital to see a doctor as he requested, hoever he

then left the hospital of his own accord. Hospital staff contacted police and asked them to locate him and return him for assessment. Police located him and a pursuit followed with the young man running into a café and stealing a knife. Police asked him to drop the knife and he instead ran at police. A struggle resulted with the young man being injured.

Cathie Opie (a registered nurse) and Leanne Elizabeth Thomas, were having lunch at a coffee shop in Cinders Lane, Armidale. Elaine Christine Towner (a registered nurse) was also having lunch with a friend at a nearby bistro. Hearing the commotion they ran outside the coffee shop to see the young man lying on the roadway. Cathie offered her help and saw the man was pale and had a weak pulse however was not breathing. She immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Elaine Towner came to assist with the CPR obtaining a mask and performing Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) while Cathie continued with the compressions. Leanne Thomas also offered assistance by taking over EAR from Elaine when she tired.

Further Police arrived at the scene moments later and an ambulance was called. Former Detective Senior Constable Michael Brooks took over the chest compressions as Cathie was tiring. The ambulance arrived and stabilised the victim and transported him to hospital. The young man had a history of mental illness and suffered paranoid delusions. Throughout the ordeal Police maintained control, assisted with CPR and organised emergency personnel.

High Commendations are awarded to Former Detective Senior Constable Michael Brooks, Cathie Opie, Elaine Christine Towner and Leanne Elizabeth Thomas. They demonstrated real professionalism and worked as a team in a very traumatic situation in an attempt to save this person's life.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Detective Senior Constable Cole James Shanahan and Constable Lauren Gai Carney

At about 9.40pm on Sunday 19 Mary, 2013, Detective Senior Constable Cole James Shanahan and Constable Lauren Gai Carney were called to a routine priority three job relating to a 15 year old male who suffers from Asperger's syndrome. Concerned with the welfare of the male and other members of his family, his mother had called police to come and speak with her son.

On arrival at the premises Detective Senior Constable Shanahan and Contable Lauren Carney were met by the boy's mother who directed them to his room. On opening the door they found him hanging from a USB cord tied around a ceiling fain in the centre of the room. They took him down and immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) with Constable Carney commencing compressions and Detective Senior Constable Shanahan clearing his airway and commencing Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) without the aid of a mask placing himself at risk of contamination, in the process having his mouth contaminated by vomit and fluids being expelled from the youth. Throughout this time Constable Carney continued compressions, even after the arrival of the ambulance and until the patient was removed from the home and placed in the ambulance. It is estimated that CPR was performed for a period of about 35 mintues.

High Commendations are awarded to Detective Senior Constable Cole James Shanahan and Constable Lauren Gai Carney. They showed great professionalism and worked as a team in what must have been a traumatic situation. They acted in a way that further fostered the confidence in and ability of the NSW Police Force.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Rodney Sutcliffe and Sergeant Scott Blanch

On 3 April, 2014, Senior Constable Rodney Sutcliffe attended a house where a male person had been found slumped in the lounge room and was unresponsive. The patient had been prescribed medication for a back problem and it was suspected that he had taken too many tablets and as a result had fallen into unconsciousness.

He immediately removed the male from the chair and made an assessment of him. He was unconscious and not breathing. He immediately began Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and had one of the occupants of the house contact 000. He continued performing CPR until Sergeant Scott Blanch arrived and took over Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR). Together they continued CPR without stopping until the arrival of the ambulance approximately 20 minutes later.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Rodney Sutcliffe and Sergeant Scott Blanch. They showed exemplary police work and persisted on performing CPR in difficult circumstances as there were distressed relatives and friends at the scene.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Michael Pellegrini and Constable Kay Press

On 15 April, 2012 Senior Constable Michael Pellegrini and Constable Kay Press were driving along Magpie Hollow Road, Bowenfels when they saw persons in the vicinity waving them down. They observed a male person lying on the ground.

A male who identified himself as the patient's son informed them that his father had suddenly collapsed and he was unable to be aroused. Police checked the patient's vital signs and observed that he was not breathing and his eyes had rolled back.

Senior Constable Pellegrini immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). The patient was of a large stature which made CPR more difficult. Considerable force was required due to the size of the patient. Constable Press took over CPR to allow Senior Constable Pellegrini to rest due to fatigue. They continued in rotation until ambulance officers arrived at the scene. The patient was taken to hospital unconscious but alive.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Michael Pellegrini and Constable Kay Press. This was a stressful and upsetting situation and together they took control and did their utmost to preserve the life of a fellow human being.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Mark Weisback

At approximately 10.45pm on Friday, 12 April, 2012 a young man boarded a city bound train from Marayong after a rowdy 16th birthday party. Once in the vestibule area of the station he suffered a fit and collapsed to the ground. Passesngers alerted plain clothes police who were patrolling the platform. Police then called for urgent assistance and medical attention was requested.

Senior Constable Weisback was among the police who attended and along with another police officer moved the patient into the recovery position and kept close observation on him as he suffered more convulsions. On examination he found that the patient had a weak pulse, however had stopped breathing altogether. The patient was rolled on to his back and Senior Constable Weisback began Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). After several chest compressions, the patient commenced breathing on his own, however over the next ten minutes he fitted on three occasions and stopped breathing a further four times. On each occasion, Senior Constable Weisback had to perform CPR to return the patient to consciousness. Ambulance arrived and the patient was stabilised and conveyed to Blacktown Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Mark Weisback whose persistent and oustanding efforts performing CPR undoubtedly was instrumental in saving this young man's life.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Senior Constable Susan Ann Coleman and Senior Constable David Xavier

About 7.30pm on 15 January, 2013, Senior Constable Susan Ann Coleman and Senior Constable David Xavier responded to an incident in Dareton where a male had stabbed himself in the neck and was lying in a pool of blood.

Arriving on the scene they immediately ran to the victim and commenced first aid on the victim who was conscious and breathing but his condition was rapidly deteriorating. Senior Constable Collins was talking to him in an attempt to keep his eyes open, while Senior Constable Coleman was holding pads on the wound to try to stem the bleeding. The victim appeared to be intoxicated and began kicking his arms and attempting to thrash around. Senior Constable Collins took hold of his left arm and leg while Senior Constable Coleman held his right while still maintaining pressure on the wound. At one point the victim's eyes rolled back, he stopped breathing, no pulse was evident and his body was limp. Senior Constable Collins commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) immediately and the victim began breathing and a weak pulse was established. A small crowd had gathered and the police officers were now dealing with a hostile crowd and an aggressive patient. A short while later, ambulance officers arrived and the police officers helped transfer the victim on to a stretcher still maintaining pressure on the wound and trying to restrain him. The victim was eventually convyed to Mildura Base Hospital where treatment to his injuries continued.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Susan Ann Coleman and Senior Constable David Xavier who performed life saving first aid at a level beyond reasonable expectation of most persons and were instrumental in saving the life of this man.



Station Officer Darren Bofinger

Fire & Rescue NSW Award presented to: Station Officer Darren Bofinger

At approximately 12.30pm on Thursday, 29 January, 2015, Station Officer Darren Bofinger had just finished packing and loading the car and trailer after a three week camping holiday at Merry Beach when he noticed two people in the water. One was in distress while the other was desperately trying to signal for help. There was a massive swell with three metre waves. Firefighter Bofinger did not hesitate

to respond. He untied his board from the roof racks of the car and ran down to the beach. He entered the water and in minutes made his way out to the two people who were caught in a rip. He immediately assisted the female in distress by pulling her on to his board and guiding it through the massive waves to shore where he put her in the recovery position. He then went to assist the other man back to the beach. He made sure that everyone was stable and safe back on the beach. Police and Ambulance personnel arrived on the scene minutes later with the rescue helicopter following 10 minutes later. The patients were assessed and treated for shock by paramedics.

High Commendations are awarded to Station Officer Darren Bofinger for his fearless and selfless actions. His ability and efficiency to rescue these people are a credit to Fire & Rescue NSW.



Retained Firefighter Samuel Lawson

Fire & Rescue NSW Award presented to: Retained Firefighter Samuel Lawson

On 17 March, 2016 Retained Firefighter Samuel Lawson was walking along Salt Beach, Kingscliff with his wife when they came across a man waving his arms around, out in the surf, obviously struggling in the huge surf. Samuel did not hesitate and entered the water and battled his way through the rip and the swell to get to the man.

Two onlookers also entered the water to try to help but also became stuck in the rip. After assisting the man to safety Sam then went back into the water to rescue these two people. Once all were back on the beach, he assessed the man and finding that he was not breathing commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). NSW Ambulance and Police arrived soon afterwards and the man was conveyed to hospital where he made a full recovery.

High Commendations are awarded to Retained Firefighter Samuel Lawson for putting his own life at risk and responding selflessly without hesitation to rescue these people. He carried out an exceptionally brave act while off duty in undertaking the successful rescue of three people in dangerous surf conditions.



Andrew Macdonald

Rural Fire Service Award presented to: Andrew Macdonald

On 5th September, 2015 Group Captain Andrew Macdonald was returning home from attending a Rural Fire Service (RFS) volunteer training course in the Blue Mountains when he came across the scene of a single vehicle accident near Luddenham. A car had careered off the road and had hit a tree.

On initial inspection, the female driver of the car was trapped in the wreckage, appeared to be unconscious and showing no signs of life. After making an urgent radio call for ambulance and police assistance on the local RFS channel, Andrew grabbed his first aid kit and entered the crashed vehicle by the passenger door and went to the aid of the driver. A lady who identified herself as a nurse also came to help. Realising that the driver may have suffered a heart attack, Andrew retrived an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) from his vehicle and the nurse assisted by placing the AED on the driver while Andrew commenced External Cardiac Compressions (ECC). Due to the level of physical entrapment of the driver, it was impossile to remove her from the vehicle. Andrew then continued ECC for at least another 10 minutes until the arrival of NSW Police who helped by taking turns every few minutes delivering chest compressions. Andrew continued ECC while emergency services arrived on scene and commenced setting up their equipment to provide emergency care to the driver.

High Commendations are awarded to Group Captain Andrew Macdonald for his quick response and determined effort to preserve the life of a fellow human being.

Registrar's Report


As a novice Registrar the year hasn't been without its challenges. I open this report by thanking my predecessor, Scherie McDonell as well as Leane Macallister, Member Liaison, not forgetting my resident expert adviser on all things competition, Roz Grey, C & C Chair for their assistance as I muddled through.

The capitation records for the 2016/17 season show the number of participants in C&C activities remains relatively stable. As the C & C Committee looks to meet the challenge of promoting increased participation in competition based activities it is worth noting that National Branch's Project Officer for Lifesaving Sport and Development has been given a brief to focus on development and implementation of programmes targeting young children in the 8 - 14 age group. There has already been substantial engagement with NSW C & C which should enhance any initiatives we take locally.

Naturally, the support of the Board in providing resources to direct to efforts to revitalise NSW competition is as welcome as it is timely given current National Branch competition initiatives.

For those who prefer numbers to words:

1. This graph represents the history of capitations for the last 12 seasons adjusted to eliminate the effect of 3 clubs whose member numbers were high but who had no more than 4 competitors in any one of those years. The numbers have stabilised over the last two seasons (at 144 and 143), albeit slightly below the long term year on year average.

NSW Representative Competition Report

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Competitive season started with the World Life Saving Championships in The Netherlands where the following NSW athletes were members of the combined Surf Lifesaving/Royal Life Saving Australian team in the National Teams Competition: Open - Tim Schofield and Brad Woodward; Youth – Gemma Smith, Rachel Wood, Ethan Garland and Callum Lowe Griffiths. Brad Woodward set two youth World records and followed this up representing Australia as one of the life saving athletes at the World Games in Poland.

Our competition officials were also well represented at the World Championships by Rozlynn Grey as Chief Referee of the Pool Masters Competition, Deputy Referee of all 4 SERC competitions and a senior technical official for all other competitions. Vaughan Jones and Cathy Hyne were also senior technical officials, while Geoff Grey was on the Appeals panel for the pool championships. A number of our NSW members represented their individual clubs in the World Interclub Championships or World Masters Championships.

AUSTRALIAN POOL LIFE SAVING CHAMPIONSHIPS

The NSW RLS State team competed with distinction at the RLSSA Australian Pool Life Saving Championships held in Melbourne over four days in January. They regained the overall Australian Pool Life Saving Championship title as well as winning a number of other national titles. Most of the athletes won medals or achieved personal best times. Of particular note was Lachlan Braddish who was named as the Male Lifesaver of the Meet, an outstanding accomplishment for an Under 16 competitor.

I would like to thank the Management team for the commitment they showed to the team: Andrew Bowden (Coach), Max Gonzales (manager) and Kerry Armstrong (chaperone). As well as the required coaching or management, they all provided structure during the the week of competition giving experienced guidance and support to the athletes. It's the many small behind the scenes activities that the team members appreciate including appropriate on-pool food, video recording, helping through warm up and cool downs and calming frayed nerves when required.

The NSW team of 18 comprised nine female athletes and nine male athletes. The team continued to include several athletes from regional NSW including Byron Bay, Central Coast and Wollongong. A number of the athletes also competed in the World Life Saving Championships in The Netherlands and then backed up by representing NSW at the Interstate Surf Lifesaving Championships so they are to be commended for maintaining their enthusiasm for this final competitive Championship at the end of a hectic six months.

Two coaching sessions were held in November and December leading into the Australian National Pool Lifesaving Championships. Additional SERC and CPR training was conducted during the evenings at the accommodation. A big thank you to Mitch Parkes who assisted all the members in preparation for these events.

Once again, the team remained young and inexperienced but with one more year under their belt and with experience, commitment and further training throughout the coming year the team will continue to improve leading into the 2018 National Championships and later in the year, the World Championships both being held in Adelaide. The team displayed professionalism, comradeship and humility as well as a respect and sportsmanship for their opposition.

The team commenced the competition program with many sensational performances on day one, except for the mixed results in the line throw. This was followed by an amazing second day of competition where the team dominated the speed events. However there is still improvement needed in both CPR and SERC even though the SERC teams showed improvement on the last two years of

results due to the efforts of Mitch Parkes. At the beginning of the last day the point score was on par between NSW, Qld and Victoria. While the individual results were good, it was once again the relays where the team showed their spirit and passion for the state. The team won four of the five last relays with a record-breaking fin relay to finish off the week. These final day performances lead to an outstanding result in regaining the Sir Percy Joske Trophy. Hopefully this group of athletes will continue training throughout the year and remain together and make sure we repeat this year's result in 2018.




