Operations



The 2012/13 year has been another successful one for Royal Life Saving NSW and the operations team, with many significant programs and projects delivered across New South Wales. During the last 12 months it has been our operational aim to address key drowning prevention priority areas. Some of the priority areas for 2012/13 included:

Reduce drowning deaths by strengthening the aquatic industry.

With over 300 public swimming pools across NSW these facilities not only provide employment opportunities for local people but also play a vital role in aquatic skill development, recreation, sport and healthy active lifestyles in the community. Through the collaborative

support of key government agencies and water safety partners such as Statewide Mutual, Royal Life Saving NSW implemented a range of initiatives to strengthen industry skills, career development and risk compliance.

Reduce drowning deaths in inland waterways.

NSW has an abundant array of inland waterways which are often common recreational locations, both for activities that take place in or on the water and the use of public spaces alongside these waterways. The environmental characteristics of inland waterways vary greatly as do patterns of usage. Environmental characteristics which influence hazards include; crumbling banks and shifting beds, strong or unpredictable currents, submerged hazards, increased turbidity and low visibility, variable water depths and cold water temperatures. 30% of NSW drownings in the last ten years have occurred in inland waterways. During 2012/13 Royal Life Saving NSW launched the Inland Water Safety Risk Assessment which involved the physical auditing of 100 inland waterway sites. The risk assessment assesses signage compliance, hazards, access and egress points and provides land owners with a comprehensive improvement plan in which to implement.

Reduce drowning deaths in people aged 55+.

Each year in Australia over 100 people aged over 55 years drown. With greater emphasis on healthy lifestyles many older Australians partake in a range of aquatic activities. The Grey Medallion program is a water safety and lifesaving skills initiative for older adults. It aims to encourage a healthy, independent and active lifestyle through the development of essential skills in order to participate in aquatic recreation activities safely.

This practical program provides older adults with personal survival techniques, improved swimming skills, skills to deal with emergency situations and a thorough understanding of water safety knowledge in order to reduce the likelihood of drowning. Through the support of the NSW Government, Royal Life Saving NSW has implemented over 50 programs during 2012/13 through aquatic centres across NSW. Over the next 12 months a further 50 programs will be implemented.

Reduce alcohol and drug related drowning deaths.

Drinking alcohol can be sometimes seen as part of the Australian culture. In some communities it can be seen as both normal and sociable and occasionally appeals to people of all ages and from all walks of life. Drinking is completely integrated into Australian culture so people unfortunately often drink in a wide range of situations and on a wide variety of occasions.

However, the use of alcohol prior to partaking in aquatic activity has been shown to significantly increase the risk of drowning due to a range of physical and behavioural changes that occur when alcohol has been consumed.

Recognition of the role of alcohol as a risk factor for drowning, near drowning and other injury associated with water-related activities is increasing. Research on the contribution of alcohol in drowning deaths has suggested that approximately 30% of adolescent drowning deaths involve alcohol.

It is for this reason that both Royal Life Saving NSW and the NSW Government have established the Swim SAFE Swim SOBER initiative. Swim SAFE Swim SOBER has been developed to address the unacceptable high number of aquatic related deaths and injuries amongst adolescents who consume alcohol and undertake high risk aquatic activity.

Swim SAFE Swim SOBER is a new innovative online program that is designed to challenge and engage secondary students. The online program contains 4 online modules that address key alcohol issues pertinent to school students and adolescents. This initiative will be further implemented over the later phases of 2013.

Reduce drowning deaths in children aged 0-14 years

In the past 10 years, 67 children aged 0 to 4 have drowned in New South Wales swimming pools. From 29 April 2013, swimming pool owners are required to register their backyard swimming pools at www.swimmingpoolregister.nsw.gov.au

The Register was established to promote pool safety and pool compliance in response to the challenge of reducing the number of deaths and injuries to children in backyard swimming pools in NSW. The Register also provides pool owners with pool safety checklists to help them self-assess the safety of their pool. Royal Life Saving has played a key role in providing information on backyard swimming pool safety and working with the NSW media and NSW Government to ensure pool owners understand their obligations when it comes to pool safety. Further details on some of these programs is provided in each of the operation unit reports within this annual report.

Finally, a special thanks to our volunteers, industry personnel and subject matter experts who have assisted with the development of new programs and services over the last 12 months. Such commitment ensures we are well placed to challenge aquatic related injury and death and provide the communities of NSW with the skills and knowledge to enjoy all our waterways and associated activities.

Training and Education



The 2012/13 year has been highly eventful for the Training and Education department of Royal Life Saving Society NSW. The Society has again provided a range of education programs to schools, aquatic facilities, community groups and many businesses. These programs are the foundation of Royal Life Saving and provide for safer communities. A community ready to respond not only in the case of an emergency but one which can identify risky behaviours and act before an emergency arises.

The Society's vocational arm continues to deliver nationally recognised training programs throughout the state. In the 2012/2013 year,

Royal Life Saving delivered over 25,000 units of competency to individuals trained in areas such as Pool Lifeguard, First Aid, Resuscitation, Defibrillation and Pool Operations (Technical Operations). In partnership with AUSTSWIM, The Society has also trained thousands of people in teaching others to swim. Our Training partners and Staff should be recognised in the success of Vocational Training. Their energy, knowledge and skill contribute greatly to the professionalism of the organisation and promote a successful training environment for the community.

Royal Life Saving has long been a provider of training and assessment services to the aquatic and recreation industry. It has prided itself on ensuring that its training agenda satisfies industry needs and caters for the demands of employees. Royal Life Saving has collaborated with the Aquatic and Recreation Industry, network partners, Government and Service Skills Australia to ensure future training agendas meet the business needs of the aquatic and recreation industry. For the first time, The Society has enrolled learners into a full qualification under its scope which is a major step for the organisation. The Certificate III in Aquatics, skills participants with a combination of proficiencies such as lifeguarding, technical operations, swim teaching and customer service. As an industry recognised qualification, the Certificate III will serve to further promote the professionalism of the aquatic and recreation industry, vital to the success of saving lives.

The Society's learning website has received a huge makeover this year and is now home to many course options. Joining our First Aid in a Box and Emergency Care courses is a new Resuscitation online course, stage one of a Pool Operators course and the new Swim Safe Swim Sober initiative for school aged students. All of these programs are made available to a wider audience through the flexibility of online learning. Royal Life Saving can guarantee that the platform of online courses will continue to grow and we look forward to promoting new education initiatives into the future.

For the service they provide to their local communities, I believe it is highly important to acknowledge our Examiners right across the state. The willingness of individuals to volunteer their time in order to educate others in saving lives and reducing drowning deaths is highly commendable. Without your ongoing support, I doubt that we would see the successes that the Society has experienced in educating the community on water safety and in reducing drowning deaths. Royal Life Saving is extremely appreciative of the ongoing activity of Examiners and we look forward to providing even greater support and new initiatives for you over the coming year.

Our commitment to collaboration has been the key to the success for training and education programs. The Society would like to thank the many partners and agencies, venues and suppliers, who have assisted in the professionalism of the organisation and the commitment we have made to saving lives. I'd especially like to recognise the NSW Department of Education and Communities, the Aquatic and Recreation Institute, the Australian Resuscitation Council, our NSW Registered Club partners, our learning partners at Canopi and Janison, and two key suppliers in Laerdal and Fast Aid. We look forward to working with you again and all those committed to saving lives and educating the community well into the future.

Aquatic Industry Services



The Aquatic Industry Services department has had a busy 2012/2013 year. A variety of new initiatives have been developed to assist the industry in managing risk and maintaining compliance across all aspects of daily operations.

Statewide Water Quality Initiative

With changes to the Public Health Act and Public Health Regulation coming into effect this year, in addition to increasing community pressure and expectations for aquatic facilities to continue to provide access to safe and clean swimming pools and spas, the need for demonstrable competence in management of water quality was recognised.

Through the support of Statewide Mutual, Royal Life Saving NSW developed a training program for senior pool staff and Council environmental health officers responsible for the monitoring and maintenance of water quality at public swimming pools and spa pools. The Statewide Water Quality Initiative focuses on processes for daily management of water quality, hazard identification and assessment, and compliance with industry best practice. The initiative is comprised of a face to face training session, followed by online activities, assessment tasks, and workbook activities.

In 2012/2013, over 40 Statewide Water Quality sessions took place across NSW, with more than 350 pool staff and environmental health officers in attendance. Royal Life Saving NSW is continuing the initiative into 2013/2014, providing free Statewide Water Quality Initiative training to more council areas across the state. We would like to thank Statewide Mutual for their continued support.

Black Spot Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments

The continued management of safe aquatic facilities requires ongoing work from both Royal Life Saving NSW and the aquatic industry. It is important that standards, policies and practices are in place to ensure a safe aquatic environment. Risk management is an essential tool for the successful and continued operation of an aquatic or leisure facility.

Royal Life Saving NSW introduced the Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment (AFSA) over 10 years ago. The AFSA provides an independent and comprehensive assessment of the operations of an aquatic facility, and is based on the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation (GSPO), Australian Standards and relevant State legislation.

Over the past decade there has been an increase in the level of cooperation between water safety agencies and Government to address the issue of aquatic venue safety. Through the support of the NSW Government 'Black Spot Fund' Royal Life Saving NSW secured funds to provide 150 complimentary AFSAs to aquatic facilities across the sate. Many of these facilities had not experienced the auditing process before, and were appreciative of the support provided by Royal Life Saving to assist their facility with safety and compliance improvements.

Following the completion of the 150 assessments, a State of the Industry report was compiled using the results of the AFSAs to determine the strengths and weaknesses of the aquatic industry in NSW. This report is soon to be released.

Inland Water Safety Risk Assessments

In addition to the AFSAs, Royal Life Saving NSW received Government 'Black Spot Funds' to develop and implement the Inland Water Safety Risk Assessment (IWSRA) initiative. The initiative involves auditing of open water environments (rivers, lakes, dams) that are utilised by the community for recreational or similar activities. The IWSRA assesses signage compliance, hazards, access and egress points and provides land owners with a comprehensive safety improvement plan for implementation. During 2012/2013 Royal Life Saving NSW completed 100 IWSRA in collaboration with local land owners.

Certificate III in Aquatics

In 2012/2013 Royal Life Saving NSW collaborated with the aquatic and recreation industry, network partners, Government and Service Skills Australia to ensure future training agendas satisfy industry needs and cater for the demands of the aquatic and recreation industry.

Royal Life Saving was successful in achieving funding support to train 45 regional employees and 25 Sydney based employees in the Certificate III in Aquatics qualification under an initiative known as the Aquatic Leadership Program.

The Certificate III in Aquatics enables each candidate's relevant skills sets to be recognized as one whole vocational qualification. There are two optional streams to follow – Technical Operations or Swim Teacher, depending on the preference of the candidate.

In 2012/2013 18 of these funded candidates were awarded their qualification, with the rest to complete the Certificate III in the coming months.

Health Promotion



Royal Life Saving NSW continues to work towards reducing water-related incidents and accidents by providing education and resources aimed at creating water-safe communities. During 2012/2013 we provided water safety awareness and programs to various local community groups, organisations and individuals including parents, carers, young children and the general public. Our aim is to ensure that all Australian's have a safe and fun experience in, on and around aquatic environments.

Our Keep Watch initiative continues to be the key drowning prevention and water safety program for parents and carers of children under

five years of age. RLS NSW has provided information sessions about our Keep Watch program to local playgroups, preschools, parent groups and community groups. The program has a wide variety of resources and sub-programs targeting parents and carers that are designed for specific locations such as bath time, the farm and public pools. We continue to distribute Keep Watch resources across NSW, as requested and when needed at no cost.

This year, all public pools in the state were invited to join the Keep Watch @ Public Pools program or receive resources free of charge as part of the NSW Government Black Spots funded initiative in NSW. The Keep Watch @ Public Pools program is not only intended to ensure the safety of children at aquatic facilities but also to support staff of public aquatic facilities in the education of patrons about key water safety messages and the importance of active parental supervision. These facilities were surveyed as part of a research project to determine the understanding by industry and facility patrons of supervision requirements for children of different ages at public swimming pools.

The annual Royal Life Saving NSW Drowning Report (2012) was released with a finding of 105 people who drowned in New South Wales waterways between 1 July 2011 and 30 June 2012; this is an increase of 3 (3%) on the five year average. Of the people who drowned in NSW in 2011/12, 84% were male and the largest number of drowning deaths occurred in the 18- 24 years and 25-34 years age groups. The most common locations for drowning deaths in New South Wales were River / Creek / Stream locations (32%), followed by Beaches (19%) and Rocks (17%). The most common activities being undertaken immediately prior to drowning were Swimming, Recreating or using Watercraft (17% respectively).

Thanks to funding received from the NSW Government, local councils (including Parramatta Council and North Sydney Council) and local clubs, Royal Life Saving NSW has been able to provide a number of Grey Medallion courses during 2012/2013 across NSW. The Grey Medallion is a water safety and lifesaving skills program that aims to reduce drowning and near-drowning of over 55 year olds. The program focuses on water safety knowledge, resuscitation and emergency care, aquatic exercise and personal survival and lifesaving skills. Through the support of the NSW Government, a further 50 programs will be implemented over the next 12 months, as we work towards a reduction in drowning rates amongst older Australians.

To celebrate 2013 NSW Seniors Week, Royal Life Saving NSW with the support of the Department of Family and Community Services, held Aqua Health Sessions for seniors at Royal Life Saving's Aquatic Safety Training Academy located in Seven Hills. The two-hour sessions included activities such as water safety education, resuscitation awareness and aqua fitness.

This year, with the support of the NSW Government, Royal Life Saving provided financial support to fund 150 Indigenous children within the community to participate in a Learn to Swim program. Additionally, Royal Life Saving is developing a range of culturally specific Keep Watch Resources and messages. Indigenous communities have an elevated risk profile when it comes to drowning and near-drowning in NSW. Indigenous drowning data indicates that this group is over three times more likely to drown than non-indigenous Australians.

Finally, Royal Life Saving NSW would like to thank the following Clubs for their support and generosity in assisting the health promotion unit to implement a range of programs including First Aid training to at-risk families, CPR training to students, Learn to Swim for people with a disability, water safety workshops for culturally and linguistically diverse communities (targeting parents, youth and seniors) and Grey Medallion programs, as part of the ClubGRANTS program. Aquatic Safety Training Academy (ASTA)



I am pleased to report ASTA continues to grow each year since it began operation in July, 2010. It gives me great pleasure to report 87,669 total visits to ASTA occurred throughout the 2012/2013 year with similar growth expected in the future. Some highlights for 2012/2013 are listed below:

Swim & Survive - Swim School

Total Enrolments

Term 3 2012	Term 4 2012	Term 1 2013	Term 2 2013
1002	1247	1436	1407

Enrolments have continued to grow each term. Programs like the Under Five, Swim and Survive and the Swim & Survive Project 10,000 showcased the facility to the members of the community. ASTA delivered over 3000 free learn to swim classes to 300 disabled, disadvantaged, CALD community or Indigenous children.

ASTA also conducted a schools learn to swim program for six local schools (861 students) which is approximately 8610 lessons provided to primary and high school students during the year.

Vocational Education & Training

ASTA has continued to facilitate VET training for the NSW Branch, with 1988 participants taking part in Pool Lifeguard, Pool Operations, First Aid, Bronze Medallion & CPR courses.

ASTA is the host employer to a Hills Sports High School student/trainee, who is completing her Certificate II in Sport & Recreation.

Health and Fitness

There are currently 142 AquaHealth members with a total of 1723 visits for this year. Fitness Swimming and Aqua deep yield equally the most patronage. The Grey Medallion program has been a good introduction to the AquaHealth program when it has been conducted at ASTA.

Water Safety and Lifesaving Developments

ASTA has assessed 391 students as part of the Aquatic Survival Challenges, and conducted Bronze Medallion courses for 28 students from two high schools. We hope to introduce Pool Lifeguard courses and Austswim Teacher of Swimming & Water Safety this coming summer (Term 4 & 1).

Community Developments

ASTA partnered up with an organisation HARDA (Horn of Africa Relief & Development Agency). Through funding from Club NSW we facilitated free learn to swim classes for 130 African refugees in Western Sydney over the school holidays from December 2012 to April 2013.

ASTA has also facilitated AUSTSWIM's MATE program (Making A Terrific Experience) for carers and families of people with a disability, Rip Awareness program and an Indigenous Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Program. All initiatives were "black spot" funded and delivered to participants free of charge.

Business Developments

To generate activity during off peak times ASTA allows other organisations access to the facility. We continue to have agreements with Pre Uni College, One Body (triathlon group), More Sports (Korean learn-to-swim), Gateway Physio and State Emergency Services.

Industry Developments

ASTA continues to provide AUSTSWIM candidates with a venue to train and be assessed. Fifteen candidates passed this year.

At the recent Aquatic & Recreation Institute awards dinner in May, ASTA was awarded the AH Pierce "Facility of the Year Award", one of ASTA swim teachers received a High Commendation at the NSW Water Safety & AUSTSWIM Awards last September and this year ASTA was awarded Bronze at the 2012 NSW Sport safety Awards for Outstanding Safe Sports Practice.

Hunter Regional Office

The 2012/13 year has been an exceptional time for the Royal Life Saving Hunter Office. The Office has been successful in implementing a range of new programs and services and has witnessed the increasing demand for information and products. The Hunter Office has been active in the media and our campaigns have focused on local content and events. Our media commitments allow us to engage large sectors of the community and to tailor drowning prevention programs and messages to meet local issues.

Over the 12 month period the Royal Life Saving Hunter Office has maintained a positive and collaborative partnership with Government agencies at both local and state level which in turn has ensured a continued commitment to drowning prevention strategies in the Hunter Region. In particular I would like to acknowledge and thank the significant commitment of the Department of Communities in the Hunter who greatly assist in the distribution of information and delivery of water safety initiatives. Such relationships ensure widespread community engagement and ensure that information and service demands are met.

I would like to use this opportunity to thank the aquatic industry in the Hunter Region who provide a valuable contribution to water safety education and training to local residents throughout the Hunter. Public Swimming Pools are valuable social assets and are critically important in the provision of a range of recreational, community and health activities. This year the Hunter Office has worked on further establishing mutually beneficial relationships with Public Swimming Pools through the provision of training, resource allocation, risk management advice and water safety collateral in the form of brochures and fact sheets. Some of the more significant developments include:

- Risk auditing of 17 Public Swimming Pools in the Hunter
- Expansion of Swim and Survive Partner Pool program
- Wide spread implementation of Keep Watch@Public Pools program
- Implementation of Certificate III in Aquatics and Certificate IV in Community Recreation for industry employees
- Primary School Leadership program
- Expansion of Grey Medallion program.

Many of these initiatives have been heavily subsidised by Royal Life Saving, the NSW Government and local Registered Clubs. Such support provides for an elevation in industry professionalism and further engagement of communities in the Hunter.

I would like to thank the Australian Training Company who have partnered with the Hunter Office to provide Certificate IV in Community Recreation to industry personnel. For many years the aquatic industry has been known as a transient employment sector and thus loses skilled and knowledgeable employees. By developing a more structured career pathway through the implementation of industry qualifications we have a better chance of retaining quality industry staff and importantly provide valuable employment t opportunities. The Certificate IV in Community Recreation formalises many of the life skills and non-accredited training experiences undertaken by employees within industry and results in the issuing of an industry qualification.

Regional Offices are heavily reliant on the dedication and commitment of their Examiner network. These individuals are critical communicators of lifesaving skills and knowledge. Examiners in the Hunter region have provided thousands of hours of education and training provision to students, parents and community groups. This ensures that many of our most vulnerable community members learn to swim, survive, resuscitate and save lives. Royal Life Saving's commitment to the reduction of the state drowning toll can only be met through the ongoing support and drive of our Examiner's. I would therefore like to thank all Examiners who provide a significant service to the saving of lives each and every year.

Our local Schools are also important conduits for water safety education and their ongoing pursuit of current information and services from Royal Life Saving indicates a positive commitment to drowning prevention. Many Schools have been long term supported and for this I thank them sincerely.

I would like to use this opportunity to thank Jackii Downie from the Hunter Office whose professionalism and passion for her role ensures that the Office continues to function each and every day.

Finally, I would like to use this opportunity to thank the Royal Life Saving Board of Directors and its CEO David Macallister. The vision and direction provided to the Hunter Office clearly articulates a sound direction and understanding of the key water safety issues impacting regional and remote NSW.

The Hunter Office looks forward to the coming year and a continued commitment to the communities within the Hunter.



Illawarra Regional Office

The Illawarra Regional office, like the other regional offices of the Royal Life Saving NSW Branch, has a vast span of territory with a large variety of waterways to contend with. The Illawarra Regional Office includes and captures the areas and populations of Campbelltown, Camden, Wollondilly, Wingecarribee, Goulburn, Wollongong, Shellharbour, Shoalhaven, Eurobodella and the Bega Valley shires. The waterways of the region include the Illawarra and southern NSW coastline to the east, together with various rivers, creeks, dams, public swimming pools, private backyard pools and manmade water features such as ponds. It gives me great pleasure to report, despite the regional outline above, drownings in the 0-5 age group remain at a minimum compared to other parts of our State. However, a concern for the region and something we will focus on over the next 12 months is the 45+ age group. The challenge for the regional office continues to be to target water safety education programs to all communities within the region so our families, friends and community members can participate safely in aquatic activities.

The NSW branch has taken on a range of new drowning prevention initiatives involving data collection activities that we hope will help to reduce the incidence of drowning in the future. These new programs include:

- The Statewide Water Quality Initiative
- Aquatic Facility Safety Audits
- Inland Water Safety Risk Assessments
- Certificate III in Aquatics

It has been a busy 2012/2013 year and despite the addition of the above initiatives, I am pleased to report the core business of the region has continued targeting the reduction of drowning and near drowning numbers in the Illawarra. We continued to deliver:

- VET courses including First Aid, Pool Lifeguard, Pool Operations, etc
- Community courses including Bronze Medallion and Swim & Survive
- Public Awareness programs including Keep Watch and Keep Watch @ Public Pools
- Grey Medallion targeting the 55+ age group

Special mention this year to the Wollongong multicultural water safety committee including but not limited to Wollongong City Council, Department of Communities (Sport and Recreation), Surf Lifesaving Illawarra and of course Royal Life Saving Illawarra. This group has spent many hours giving to the community opportunities of engagement in aquatic environments to new Australians. I am certain after its initial success these relationships will continue and it is hoped these programs will be duplicated into neighbouring councils. The attitude of the committee members is wonderful as the organisations work toward a common outcome. It goes to show that working together works well for the community.

I am pleased to advise the Society continues to grow and focus on saving lives. I must thank Bronwyn Poulton for her service to the regional office. Unfortunately she has left Royal Life Saving employment. I am pleased to say however that the very competent Nicole Schofield has joined our professional team, alongside Tracey and Carly who have been with us for many years.

In closing, I would like to thank all who have continued to support and work with the Illawarra Regional Office, the staff at all levels of Royal Life Saving NSW Branch including head office and our other regional offices, all levels of government and the community. I am certain we are making a difference and I look forward to the busy times ahead.

Riverina Regional Office

Again it is that time of year for reporting on what has been a constant and at times extremely busy twelve months. The Riverina Office has been able to provide again a high level of effectiveness and efficiency in the provision of the aims and ideals of the Society. Our workload was significantly increased due to several new projects and it is through these that we have been able to establish new partnerships and contacts both within the aquatic and community network.

The regional office conducted 20 Swimming Pool Safety Assessment during the past twelve months under regional black spot funding. The pleasing aspect was that for many pools and aquatic facilities that this was their first time to undergo a full safety assessment by an industry affiliate. The support shown by all Councils and operators was very pleasing and the next phase is to ensure that ongoing information and guidance is provided to those in need. The ability to manage and rectify any concerns identified in the reports is, and can be a long process, however, a constant and vigilant approach to risk management will ensure safer aquatic environments for all. A second phase of facility assessments for the following year is already in the planning stage.

In conjunction with Statewide Mutual Royal Life Saving conducted a number of workshops within the region primarily to assist local council staff and pool operators to become more conversant and understanding of the need to adopt a measured and standardized approach to water quality in the community. Again these workshops were provided across a number of local government areas with more workshops being programmed for the 2013/2014 year. The contacts within local government have grown substantially and will no doubt assist the Riverina Regional Office in development and growth over the years to come.

Our Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs have again shown consistency and growth over the year. We have increased the number of participants in aquatic based programs over the past year and it is hoped that this trend will continue onwards. Our foray into full Certificate training continues and has given the organisation another string to add to the bow of its Training and Education arm.

In partnership with the Office of Communities Sport and Recreation a pilot program was delivered to 6 participants at the Wagga Juvenille Justice Centre. In what could be only described as a resounding success, VET qualifications were achieved by all students participating in a Pool Lifeguard program. The success of the project lay within the support, professionalism and help of centre staff, Shephards Park School and the Offices of Communities NSW.

Staffing - There has been a recent addition to the ranks within the Riverina Regional Office with the appointment of Gus Bormann to the position of Project Co ordinator. Gus has long been associated with the aquatics industry and brings a wealth of experience in training and assessment with him. We wish him all the best in his new role with the Society and in particular the Riverina Office.

Finally as I conclude this annual report I would like to thank all of those who have been involved directly and indirectly with the regional office over the past year. Each individual office of Royal Life Saving possesses dedicated and loyal staff, who, at some stage have assisted us to perform and provide services to this region and the people within.

Western Regional Office

It was another great year in the Western Region during 2012/2013 and our office was kept busy with courses and programs throughout a very hot summer. In addition to the many people undertaking lifesaving, first aid and water safety training with us, partnerships developed in preceding years were put to good use as we engaged community and industry in various funded projects, targeted at reducing the number of deaths from drowning in NSW and strengthening the aquatics industry.

Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment Initiative

There are many aquatic facilities in NSW with a range of safety issues managed by a variety of organisations. These facilities and venues play a vital role in aquatic skill development, recreation and leisure pursuits, sport and healthy active lifestyles of local communities. Aquatic facilities provide employment opportunities for local people and are essential to the social fabric of the community, particularly in regional and remote communities. The Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment (AFSA) provides an independent and comprehensive assessment / audit of the operations of an aquatic facility. The AFSA is based on the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation (GSPO), relevant Australian Standards, industry best practice and State legislation. In the Western Region twenty pools took advantage of the funding opportunity available under this NSW Government Black Spot initiative to improve risk management procedures for the continued successful operation of their facilities.

Grey Medallion

The Grey Medallion is a lifesaving and personal water safety program targeting older adults, who are unfortunately increasing in number each year in the drowning statistics. Under this particular Black Spot funding initiative we were able to provide aquatic centres with resources to implement and develop the Grey Medallion program in their local communities. Planning and implementation was undertaken by the Narromine, Dubbo, Cowra, Orange and Parkes communities last summer with more looking to come on board or revisit the program again in the warmer months ahead. The Grey Medallion is a great way for aquatic centres to attract a different user demographic and develop water safety, fitness and lifesaving skills within the local adult community.

Keep Watch @ Public Pools

In the past nine years, 34 people have drowned at public swimming pools. 41% of these were children under 10 years of age. A lack of direct supervision by the parent and carer while a child was in the water has been the main factor in the majority of these drowning deaths at public pools. Through the Black Spot funding initiative, Royal Life Saving NSW was able provide public pools in the Western Region with a range of resources in which to inform, educate and engage parents and carers of children at no cost to the centres. This was a great initiative that saw sixty-two local pools receive the resources necessary to create a safe place of recreation for families.

Certificate III in Aquatics

Royal Life Saving worked with the aquatic and recreation industry, network partners, Government and Service Skills Australia to ensure future training agendas meet the business needs of the aquatic and recreation industry. The aquatic and recreation industry identified a need for a highly-skilled workforce to improve productivity and compete in a changing economy. Royal Life Saving was successful in achieving funding support to train thirty regional / remote employees in the Certificate III in Aquatics qualification under an initiative known as the Aquatic Leadership Program. The fund is part of the Australian Government's Building Australia's Future Workforce package and also forms part of Australian Government Skills Connect, an initiative designed to consolidate Government skills programs and better target training to meet industry and employer needs. Training provided under this initiative included First Aid, Pool Lifeguard, Aquatic Supervision (Technical Operations) and Customer

Service. Seven aquatic centres in our region took advantage of this program, enrolling nine staff members to upskill their existing qualifications to the Certificate III level. In addition, a similar program funded by the Elsa Dixon Aboriginal Employment Program saw five Indigenous lifeguards undertake the Certificate III program to develop their competence within the aquatic setting.

Statewide Water Quality Initiative

Through the support of Statewide Mutual, Royal Life Saving provided training and professional development workshops for senior swimming pool staff and environmental health officers responsible for the monitoring and maintenance of water quality at public swimming pools and spa pools. Upon it's completion the Statewide Water Quality Initiative will have engaged all Member Councils across NSW and addressed water quality and risk management issues pertaining to the NSW Public Health Act 2010 and Public Health Regulation 2012. To date ten Councils have been engaged in workshops within the Western Region with more to follow this season.

So, as you can see we have been very busy! There is much to look forward to over the coming year with the expansion and introduction of further funded initiatives as well as a consistent increase in our core business. To our fantastic trainers and volunteers, for all your efforts over the last twelve months I say thank you and keep up the great work! Thank you also to our Head Office staff and Board of Directors for your support and guidance throughout the year, and also to Nicola and Kyrstie, our irreplaceable office staff who keep us under control. We will continue to strive to provide a valuable service to the communities of the Western Region in the coming year.

These extraordinary Australians perform those skills, often in stressful situations, sometimes with multiple casualties and frequently at risk to themselves.

The following people were recognised for their efforts in attempting to save a life in emergency situations. Members of the general public were presented with Certificates of Commendation, Officers of the NSW Police Service were presented with the Police Service Award, an Officer of the Fire & Rescue NSW was presented with the Fire & Rescue NSW Award, and Officers of the NSW Ambulance Service were presented with the Ambulance Award.

The Royal Life Saving Society Australia New South Wales Branch would like to congratulate each of those people who received an award. I hope you read their citations with interest.

Lindsay Scarlett and Phillip Scarlett

Lindsay Scarlett and her husband Phillip, were on holidays at the big 4 Caravan Park at Ettalong Beach. At about 3.51pm on Saturday 11 December, 2010 they were swimming in the pool at the location along with several other holidaymakers. A young child went down the slippery dip into the pool, hitting his head on the way down rendering him unconscious. He remained floating face up in the pool for some time before Lindsay and Phillip saw him. They brought him to the edge of the pool where they put him on his side, checked for any vital signs and showing none, immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). After several minutes, the child began vomiting and regained consciousness. Ambulance paramedics arrived and took him by helicopter to Westmead Children's' Hospital. As a result of this incident, he sustained no lasting injuries and hospital staff advised that he would make a full recovery. He stayed one night in hospital for observation and was discharged.

High commendations are awarded to Lindsay and Phillip Scarlett. They quickly assessed the situation and administered CPR in a calm and professional manner which undoubtedly saved this child's life.

On Thursday 9 June, 2011, Ashley Miller was at work at the University of Sydney as the Campus Assistant Co-ordinator. He was alerted to the fact that there was a pile up of cars outside sounding their horns. Ashley went outside and immediately saw the cause to be a stationary vehicle with an elderly man slumped at the wheel.

Ashley ran to the vehicle, entering via the passenger's seat and shook the man in order to gain a response. The man was not responsive so Ashley checked for a pulse and was not able to find one. He rang emergency services and was advised that both police and ambulance officers were on their way.

With the aid of the Security Co-ordinator, Ashley removed the man from the vehicle, placed him on the roadway beside the vehicle and immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Ashley continued CPR until emergency personnel arrived who placed him into the ambulance and conveyed him to hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Ashley Miller for responding quickly and without hesitation giving assistance in what must have been a very traumatic situation.

On Sunday, 5 February 2012, a large rip had developed at Dee Why Beach and several people had been dragged out of the swimming area into very large, powerful waves. A mass rescue was performed by lifeguards using inflatable rescue boats (IRBs) and jet skis.

A little seven year old girl however had been dragged out and the IRB and the jet ski were both unsuccessful in reaching her. 14 year old Adam Hockley had managed to reach her on his body board and was fighting to keep her head out of the water. Initially Adam used his body board as a rescue aid, but the waves broke the wrist rope and the body board was lost. But Adam refused to let go of the little girl and stayed with her the whole time with absolutely no rescue equipment or rescue aids. An exhausted lifeguard on a rescue board eventually reached them and managed on the third attempt to drag her on to his board. Adam kept holding on to her all the time.

Adam suffered scratches as the little girl was struggling and panicking, but every time a huge wave came he managed to keep her close. Adam was at the end of his energy and almost out of breath and starting to think they were in real trouble, however he never gave up.

High Commendations are awarded to Adam Hockley. He put his own life at risk and put the life and safety of another person above his own in a situation of real danger.

On Sunday, 18 April, 2010, numerous police were rostered to perform duties for Operation Castell in Woollahra, which involved supervising a peaceful protest between 2 groups of people. Early in the afternoon as the crowd was beginning to disperse, a 70 year old man collapsed in the middle of the crowd.

The officers rendered immediate first aid to the man who was unconscious, very pale and was gasping for breath. Sergeant Price placed the man in the recovery position, checked his airway and then placed him on his back. Sergeant Hughes called for ambulance assistance and Constable Leckey commenced External Cardiac Compression (ECC) with Sergeant Hughes commencing Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR). Federal Agent Pacey advised that he was a former nurse and assisted with CPR. After about 10 minutes, ambulance paramedics arrived and all police officers worked together continuing CPR at the request of the ambulance officers until their equipment was in place. He was then left in the care of the ambulance officers and although his condition was serious, he regained consciousness prior to his transport to St Vincent's Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Sergeant Glenn Price, Sergeant Grant Hughes, Constable Ben Leckey and Federal Agent Matt Pacey. The teamwork of the personnel involved in this incident can only be described as exemplary and no doubt contributed to the survival of the patient.

On Wednesday, 23 March, 2011, two young friends from Wollongong University decided to go body surfing at Fairy Meadow Beach. They were inexperienced surfers and it was not long before they were in trouble in the treacherous surf conditions at the time. They were unable to swim either out to sea or back to shore as they were being continually dumped and sucked under by the breaking waves. One of the boys made the decision to try to swim to shore to raise the alarm. While being dragged south in a rip, he managed to make it to shore and ran north along the beach to the surf club where the alarm was raised and emergency services contacted.

In the meantime 2 other friends, Liam Fell and Gregory Cavill entered the water on their surfboards to search for the missing boy. A short time later they found him floating face down in the water almost 1 kilometre south of his last known location and 150 metres from shore. They managed to get his head on to one of the boards to assist his breathing until nearby lifeguard, Ian Timbrell was able to navigate the swell and waves to get to them. He was placed on a board being towed at the rear of the jet ski and immediately taken to shore where another lifeguard, Jason Foye and Senior Constables Battley and Smith were waiting. Ian Timbrell and Senior Constable Battley immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Jason Foye obtained a defibrillator from a lifeguard vehicle. Sergeant Minns and Senior Constables Smith and Battley continued CPR for approximately 30 minutes in an attempt to revive him until ambulance officers arrived via both vehicle and helicopter to convey the patient to Wollongong Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Gregory Cavill and Liam Fell, Lifeguards Jason Foye and Ian Timbrell and Senior Constables Craig Battley and Paul Smith and Sergeant Robert Minns. Everyone involved displayed a high level of professionalism and determination in trying circumstances. Though it may have been apparent to them that the victim was beyond recovery, they continued continuous CPR efforts for 20-30 minutes until the arrival of ambulance paramedics.

Senior Constable Matthew Berry, Probationary Constable Lyndsay Bradbury and Detective Sergeant Paul Roberts

About 1.10am on Monday 9 August, 2010, police were called to a property in Broken Hill in relation to a young man who had hanged himself.

On arrival at the property Senior Constable Berry and Probationary Constable Bradbury ran to the backyard of the property and found a young man lying on a concrete path. He was not moving, his lips were blue and after checking for vital signs, it was determined that he was not breathing and did not have a pulse. There were red marks around his neck. Senior Constable Berry began External Cardiac Compression (ECC) and Probationary Constable Bradbury began Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) with the use of a mask. They alternated doing ECC and EAR until Detective Sergeant Roberts arrived and was able to relieve each one of them in turn. The ambulance arrived shortly after and commenced advanced resuscitation measures and with the assistance of police, a heart beat was established. The young person was conveyed to Broken Hill Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Matthew Berry, Probationary Constable Lyndsay Bradbury and Detective Sergeant Paul Roberts. This was an extremely stressful and upsetting situation and the officers took control and did their utmost to preserve the young man's life.

On Wednesday, 21 April, 2010, Anne Smart, her family and uncle had walked to the Bermagui Fish Co-Op for Lunch. On returning home, her uncle suddenly collapsed on the roadway. Anne immediately called emergency services and commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Kenneth Needs, a neighbour of Anne's was also quick to offer his help performing CPR. Senior Constable Daniel Bishop arrived and took over the compressions from Anne and continued to be assisted by Kenneth Needs. After approximately 15 minutes, David Bridgefoot, also walking past, offered his assistance, and the three continued CPR for a period of approximately 30 minutes until the ambulance paramedics arrived. The ambulance personnel took over from Anne and David, with Senior Constable Bishop continuing to assist until the arrival of further ambulance officers. Ambulance personnel continued CPR for a further period of 30 minutes, until the patient was conveyed to Bega Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Anne Smart, David Bridgefoot, Kenneth Needs and Senior Constable Daniel Bishop for responding quickly to a traumatic situation. They all worked together as a team rendering assistance swiftly and selflessly trying to resuscitate the patient.

Early on the morning of 12 April, 2010, police were called to a property in Artarmon where a man had tried to commit suicide by hanging himself from a tree. The victim's wife had awoken to find him missing and thinking this was not normal behaviour from him, went looking and found him in the backyard. She immediately woke her children and phoned emergency services. They managed to cut the victim down and remove the rope from around his neck.

First on the scene was Senior Constable Mark Cutugno and Constable Andrew Drylie. Minutes later Constable Barry Turnbull and Leading Senior Constable Shane Eastham arrived at the scene. All officers entered the rear yard of the property and located the victim on the ground at the base of a large tree. Leading Senior Constable Eastham checked the victim and though he felt warm to touch, was not breathing and did not have a pulse. Constable Turnbull commenced External Cardiac Compression (ECC) and Leading Senior Constable Eastham commenced Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) with the aid of a mask. After several minutes, Senior Constable Cutugno and Constable Drylie took over ECC and EAR and they continued in rotation for approximately 10-15 minutes until ambulance personnel arrived and took over resuscitation. The victim had regained a heart beat and was able to be transported to Royal North Shore Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Leading Senior Constable Shane Eastham, Senior Constable Mark Cutugno, Constable Andrew Drylie and Constable Barry Turnbull. The officers showed professionalism and skill in their outstanding efforts performing CPR on this man who undoubtedly would have passed away at the scene without their intervention.

On Monday 22 March, 2010, Senior Sergeant Scott Ortlipp was travelling to work along Falcon Street, Neutral Bay when he observed a utility vehicle stopped in a centre lane and assumed that the vehicle had broken down. He drove alongside the vehicle and observed a male seated in the driver's seat, slumped forward behind the steering wheel. Approaching the driver's door, Senior Sergeant Ortlipp tried to gain the male's attention but he was unresponsive. He raised the patient's head which was limp, his eyes were fixed with unresponsive pupils and his lips were blue. Senior Sergeant Ortlipp detected a pulse, however the patient was not breathing.

Deciding that the male needed immediate resuscitation, he pulled him from the vehicle and placed him in the recovery position on the roadway. Kimberley Ballingal had been in the vehicle behind and immediately offered assistance. Belinda Sparkes, another motorist phoned emergency services and Georgia Brown, who identified herself as a nurse, also rendered assistance. Senior Sergeant Ortlipp commenced External Cardiac Compression (ECC) and Kimberley Ballingall and Georgia Brown provided Expired Air Resuscitaiton (EAR) with the aid of a mask. After 10-15 minutes had passed, the patient started to regain consciousness. He was able to provide his name and informed Senior Sergeant Ortlipp that he had taken an illicit drug. At this point ambulance personnel arrived and conveyed the patient to Royal North Shore Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Kimberley Ballingal, Belinda Sparkes, Georgia Brown and Senior Sergeant Scott Anthony Ortlipp. Their swift action and collective effort in the administering of vital first aid was undoubtedly responsible for saving the life of this male victim.

Late in the afternoon on Monday, 19 September, 2011, a group of friends were on board a 40' cruiser moored in Athol Bay when a tragic series of events, led to one of the passengers being sucked under the boat and becoming impaled on the propellor and tangled in a rope. Senior Constable Bell and Senior Constable Stefanac were on board Water Police 40 at Darling Harbour and immediately responded to the incident. On arrival at the scene, they found the victim was still conscious but critical with major injuries including his left leg being completely severed and large open wounds about his body. Most of his body was underwater with one person in the water holding his head above the water. He was exceptionally pale and appeared to be losing consciousness rapidly. After analysing the scene, Senior Constable Stefanac has taken off his shorts and appointments and jumped into the water without hesitation with the intent of freeing the victim. Senior Constable Stefanac dived under the water armed with a knife, snorkel and goggles as the visibility in the water was poor. He dived under the vessel several times before he managed to cut the victim's clothing off and cut the line away. The victim was then able to be pulled on board. Senior Constable Bell and Senior Constable Stefanac commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). CPR was carried out for several minutes until the arrival of paramedics. The victim was manoeuvred on to a spinal board and transported back to Taronga Zoo wharf and then to hospital.

Senior Constable Stefanac's actions were carried out without regard to his own personal safety in an attempt to save a life. His actions were above and beyond his call to duty and placed him in significant danger. Due to the movement of the vessel in the water there was the likelihood that he could have been struck by the propellors or become entangled in the rope himself. The water temperature was cold and with the significant blood loss during the incident, every chance that sharks would be attracted.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Peter Bell and Senior Constable Samuel Stefanac. Their actions showed great professionalism and compassion in a very traumatic situation.

New South Wales Police Award presented to:

Sergeant Lance Stebbing and Senior Constable Jamie Farrar

About 10.30am on 1 May, 2011, police responded to calls for urgent assistance for 2 rock fishermen who had been swept into the water in dangerous conditions at Middle Head. On arrival Sergeant Stebbing took up a position on a rock platform while Senior Constable Farrar searched for the missing fishermen from a vantage point on the headland.

One of the fishermen was sighted floating face up in the water. With little regard for his own safety, Sergeant Stebbing negotiated the slippery rocks and entered the rough swell to retrieve the unconscious male. With difficulty Sergeant Stebbing brought the male back to the shore and with the assistance of Senior Constable Farrar lifted him on to the rock platform above the breaking waves. Sergeant Stebbing and Senior Constable Farrar commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the male. Sergeant Stebbing was supplied a defibrillator which he applied several times on the male person. After 30 minutes of CPR by the officers, rescue helicopter paramedics arrived to take over resuscitation procedures.

High commendations are awarded to Sergeant Lance Stebbing and Senior Constable Jamie Farrar for showing great courage and composure in very hazardous conditions. Their actions showed great initiative and diligence in a very difficult situation.

Detective Constable Daniel John Lovell

On Tuesday, 2 February, 2010 police responded to an incident in Lakemba where, following an argument with 2 perople, a male person had been stabbed in the upper left side of the chest, narrowly missing his heart. He managed to run away from the incident and collapsed outside a convenience shop where the shopkeeper called emergency services. On arrival, Detective Constable Lovell found the victim semi-conscious in a pool of blood, his condition rapidly deteriorating.

Detective Constable Lovell recognised that due to the chest puncture his lungs were unable to inflate properly and he was struggling to breathe. With the aid of scissors, tape and plastic found by the shopkeeper, Deteceive Constable Lovell fashioned a wound dressing that enabled the victim to breathe without sucking in air through the puncture wound. Ambulance paramedics arrived a short time later and were able to provide further first aid care and conveyed the victim to hospital for emergency surgery.

High commendations are awarded to Detective Constable Daniel John Lovell. His innovative actions in rendering first aid to the victim on that night was far beyond the basic level of first aid and his actions directly contributed to the patient's survival and his subsequent full recovery.

Early on the morning of Monday 14 March, 2011, Senior Constable McTaggart and Constable Kendall responded to a call that a male person had attempted to harm himself by hanging. On arrival at the property, the officers went to a shed and found Matthew Brady, who had untied the patient, performing Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the patient who was lying on the concrete floor. The patient was very pale. Matthew was performing CPR on his own providing both breaths and chest compressions. Constable Kendall ran to the police vehicle and obtained a mask. Returning to the shed the officers took over from Matthew with Constable Kendall performing Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) and Senior Constable McTaggart performing External Cardiac Compression (ECC). They continued for approximately 5 minutes until ambulance officers arrived who requested the officers continue until they had set up their equipment. The ambulance personnel detected a pulse and the patient was stabilised and transported to hospital where he was admitted to the intensive care unit.

High Commendations are awarded to Matthew Brady, Senior Constable Timothy Lloyd McTaggart and Constable Adam John Kendall. Their quick actions and response to the incident have undoubtedly saved the life of the male person.

At approximately 1.40pm on 26 July, 2010 police were called to an incident outside Dee Why RSL Club where a person brandishing a firearm has attempted to hold up an armoured van. A security guard has drawn his pistol and shot this person in the chest.

Chief Inspector Green was the first to arrive on the scene and assessed the injuries on the victim. Checking for vital signs, he could only detect a very weak pulse and placed a dressing on the wound to prevent blood loss. Senior Constables Parker and Critchley and Constable Morris were next to arrive. Chief Inspector Green requested an employee of the RSL to bring him a resuscitation kit. Senior Constable Parker began Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) with the aid of a mask and Senior Constable Critchley began External Cardiac Compression (ECC). A short time later Chief Inspector Green placed the heart monitoring pads on the deceased which showed there was no pulse. Oxygen was then administered by Senior Constable Parker and Senior Constable Chrtichley continued chest compressions until ambulance personnel arrived.

High Commendations are awarded to Chief Inspector Colin Green, Senior Constable Joshua Critchley, Senior Constable Nicole Parker and Constable Kylie Morris. These officers showed great professionalism and worked together as a team in an attempt to preserve this person's life.






At approximately 2am on the morning of 18 September, 2011, Constable Holmes and his wife answered a knock on the door of their residence in Forbes. They found a young child from the house next door who informed them that their grandfather was having trouble breathing. Constable Holmes and his wife ran next door and discovered the man who was blue in the face and appeared to be not breathing.

Constable Holmes and his wife commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the male and continued for approximately 5 minutes until ambulance paramedics arrived. Mrs Holmes then attended to the distressed children at the house while Constable Holmes continued to assist ambulance officers with CPR. The man was later flown to RPA Hospital after having suffered a heart attack. He underwent immediate surgery and has since returned to Forbes to convalesce.

High Commendations are awarded to Plain Clothes Constable Dale Holmes and Chloe Holmes. Without their immediate assistance and quick actions it is very likely this man would have died. Mrs Holmes provided invaluable comfort to the children in the house at the time.

Ambulance Service Award presented to: Robert Brown and Gavin Bridges

At approximately midday on 14 August, 2011, Paramedics Robert Brown and Gavin Bridges were called

to respond to a domestic situation. After determining that police were on their way, they decided to drive by the premises in such a way as to not alert the offender and make him flee.

From a safe distance, they observed the patient slumped on the front door steps bleeding profusely. They quickly devised a rapid extrication plan to rescue her given they now had full visual scope of the front yard and house with plenty of time to retreat if the offender was still inside the house. Their

They quickly devised a rapid extrication plan to rescue her given they now had full visual scope of the front yard and house with plenty of time to retreat if the offender was still inside the house. Their rapid access plan ensured both had radios, the ambulance was parked with doors open and the risk was minimised. When they swooped on to the patient a young teenage boy appeared covered in blood who identified himself as the patient's son. He informed them that his girlfriend was also on the premises. They managed to resuce all three without further incident and left the scene for Macleay Hospital. The patient had significant injuries to her throat, neck and chest and her right hand. The offender at the scene was then involved in a siege lasting approximatelly seven hours.

High Commendations are awarded to Paramedics Robert Brown and Gavin Bridges. Their actions are testimony to their skill, strength and tenancity in attending a rescue in a potentially dangerous situation.

The defibrillator at the premises was not working, so Symon realised he would have to continue CPR until emergency services arrived which was in fact 20-30 minutes.

High Commendations are awarded to Symon Walpole. His efforts were nothing short of incredible in saving the patient's life. His actions were swift, co-ordinated and decisive in traumatic and trying circumstances.

On Wednesday 2 March, 2011, Julie Tereszkun was summoned by her neighbour who had arrived home to find her son collapsed on the floor, blue in the face and making an awful gasping sound. Julie ran back to the house and while checking the young man for vital signs, instructed her neighbour to phone 000 and try to stay calm for her son's sake.

Julie commenced Cardopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the young man and continued until emergency services arrived. Julie explained to the paramedics what the situation was and they took over the scene. She then took on the role of reassuring her neighbour and gathering the patient's personal details and health history as well as specific details of what had happened to give to the paramedics.

High Commendations are awarded to Julie Tereszkun, a registered nurse, for her swift and selfless action in rending assistance that undoubtedly saved this young man's life.

Fire & Rescue NSW Award presented to:

Michael Banister

On 1 January, 2012, Firefighter Michael Banister was walking along Cronulla Beach with his family when he noticed 2 young adults who had been swept out in a rip and appeared to be in deep water and unable to swim. Michael searched the area to find a piece of rescue equipment and located an abandoned body board. 4 other young adults had entered the water to try to help their friends, but were now also in trouble.

Michael entered the water and located the first casualty who was underwater. He pulled her on to the board and then proceeded to collect 4 others, managing to get them to cling to the board and kick their way back to the sandbar. After he got the group of 5 back safely to the sandbar, he noticed there was still one person missing. The last person, a young male was just managing to tread water outside the line of breaking waves. He managed to locate the young man and also got him to the sandbar. Once all were on the sandbar, Michael then took each person individually back to the beach.

High Commendations are awarded to Firefighter Michael Banister. He carried out an exceptionally brave act while off duty in undertaking the successful rescue of 6 people in dangerous surf conditions.

Everyone enjoyed the fine weather, Granville's facilities and co-operative staff were appreciated by the officials.

The local Hills team members had a very successful meet winning 16 gold, 5 silver and 3 bronze medals in the Interclub and National Team competitions.

Armidale & New England District Sub Branch

The sub branch has been active throughout the district in the past year. The majority of the work has been done in the schools by our members who are school teachers in those schools. The high schools (both public and private) account for the majority of awards gained by students. These schools have developed excellent lifesaving programmes that continue to train the students to high levels (as evidenced by the large number of awards from the advanced lifesaving strand claimed).

Unfortunately little lifesaving activity is carried out in the primary schools in the district, with only a few following the RLSSA swim and survive programme. Most are opting for to use the Department of Education and Training special swimming scheme for their swimming program and are not lining up the competencies achieved with swim and survive competencies. As well it has been noted by teachers in these schools that the level of swimming ability of the students overall has deteriorated. This is a concern because of the aquatic activities these students will participate in throughout their life.

At present there are RLSSA examiners in schools in the district. However it is becoming harder to attract new teachers to become examiners. At this sub branch many of our senior members are retiring from teaching and now play a lesser role in the provision of water safety and lifesaving instruction. There is a need to try to encourage younger teachers to become involved so that the programs can continue in our schools.

The level of strength of the sub branch at present can be seen from the income generated mainly from award sales - \$16,800. While a majority of these sales are to schools, The Armidale Monckton Aquatic Centre does train and test a significant number of members of the community who require RLSSA certification for their occupation.

Some major items of expenditure this season has been the purchase of new PFDs and a laser printer capable of printing on certificates.

As well as the activity in training people to the standards of the RLSSA program, the sub branch has also been involved in other community activities.

- We assisted New England TAFE in training students enrolled in the Certificate IV Allied Health
 Assistant course. This involved giving them instruction on how to care for a disabled person in an
 aquatic environment.
- We are working with Armidale Dumaresq Council to plan a community water awareness / resuscitation and home pool safety day in the early part of summer. Households who have registered as private pool owners will be invited to this day. There is a thought that as an incentive, if someone in the household trains and qualifies for a resuscitation certificate, some or the entire inspection fee may be waived.

The sub branch would like to thank the pool staff at Armidale Monckton Aquatic Centre, especially Steve Gollan and Bill Vale for all their assistance throughout the swimming season. With the large number of schools wishing to use the pool their patience is appreciated.

Unfortunately the swimmers suffer.

The Training Defibrillators have had good workouts among some of the schools, some Swimming Club members, and particularly in the Schools Staff Resuscitation renewals.

Associate Membership (NSW) has been awarded to Keith Watts, at present Supervisor of the Glen Innes Swim Centre, who is a long serving worker and promoter for Royal Life Saving, and Gillian Davis of Glen Innes High School received a Certificate of Appreciation for her work with the Society.

In the school Resuscitation Lessons, the Sub Branch has been able to set up defibrillators for both adult and child. This has helped with the Resuscitation Classes, particularly in the schools and Teacher Resuscitation Training and Renewals.

We would like to thank the Glen Innes Swim Centre and its Manager for support and assistance during the past season, and the Glen Innes Swimming Club for their support and use of their facilities.

Thanks also go to Jason Phillips and the staff at Northern Regional Office for their support and ready answers to any queries.

Thanks must go to swimmers (and parents) who have shown commitment in attending the vacation course during some unseasonable weather.

The local newspaper, Glen Innes Examiner, provided valuable publicity for which we thank them.
